

McDonald-Mihalikis Rematch Headlines Tonight's Grapple Card

ENRAGED SOCKEYE BENT ON REVENGE FOR FIRST LOSS

Brazil and Kruse Clash In Middle Go—Jim Casey and Corral Open Program

Prince Selaki Mihalikis, the only unbeaten grappler of Promoter Mack Lillard's current troupe, will engage in his second rematch in a month when he goes against enraged Sockeye Jack McDonald in the superduper main event of tonight's armory mat program.

It seems like Mihalikis can't get away from these return battles. On June 15 Mihalikis, in his first appearance here in two years, defeated Camp White's George Craig, and did it in such a manner that Craig demanded another shot at him. He got it, the next week, and the clash ended in a draw.

Then, last Monday night, Mihalikis whipped Jack McDonald in a torrid fracas, and, like Craig, McDonald was so burned up at the way the Prince gained his victory that he immediately challenged Mihalikis to a return engagement.

Mihalikis is readily agreed and now the stage is all set for what may be the most violent grapple argument staged here in months and months.

McDonald, a determined sort of fellow and tough as they come, is prepared to knock the tar out of the Arabian and as soon as possible. While Sockeye hasn't put it in words, he acts like he is planning to waste no time on legitimate tactics once he gets Mihalikis in the ring with him.

Mihalikis, on the other hand, hasn't built up a reputation as a scientific workman, although he can trade straight stuff with any of the boys, and is expected to go out here and try to get rid of McDonald in any fashion.

Meeting in the six-round middle event will be Pedro Brazil, good-looking South American champion, and Broccoli Bob Kruse, while opening the card will be Alberto Corral and Irish Jim Casey. The curtain-raiser starts at 8:30 sharp.

YANKEES DIVIDE WITH BOSTON TO HOLD MARGIN

Major league baseball teams put aside their pennant struggles today after two straight rounds of doubleheaders, and sent their stars to the inter-league classic at New York.

The New York Yankees split with the Boston Red Sox Saturday and the Philadelphia Athletics yesterday to retain their four-game lead in the American league. The Red Sox yesterday split with Washington.

Roger Wolff pitched the Athletics to a 5-4 decision over the Yankees in yesterday's first game but the champs took the second, 4-2, to give Lefty Gomez his third mound triumph of the year.

A double by Johnny Sullivan and a single by George Case in the ninth inning gave the Senators a 4-3 win over the Red Sox in their opener, but Joe Dobson blanked the Nats on five hits in the nightcap, won by the Red Sox, 3-0.

The Cleveland Indians and Detroit Tigers continued their argument over third place, which the Tribe held by winning, 5-1, behind Mel Harder's three-hit pitching after the Tigers had taken the first game, 10-1, with a 16-hit attack.

The Chicago White Sox swamped the St. Louis Browns, 14-2, as Ted Lyons pitched his 252nd major league victory and hit a double and single, but the Browns squared it, 13-2.

Eddie Miller doubled in the run that gave the Boston Braves a 6-5 verdict over the Dodgers. Then Larry French, who hasn't lost this season, pitched Brooklyn to a 2-1 triumph in the second game for his ninth win.

At Pittsburgh, a line drive struck Pitcher Paul Derringer of the Cincinnati Reds on the knee after he had blanked the Pirates for five frames in the first game, injuring him so badly he was withdrawn from the all-star game roster. Pittsburgh went on to win the game, 4-3, but Ray Starr pitched the Reds to a 5-2 decision in the after piece for his 12th decision.

The St. Louis Cardinals whipped the Chicago Cubs, 5-3 and 11-6, and the Philadelphia Phils surprised the New York Giants, 3-2 and 5-3, for their first doubleheader victory of the year.

Injuries To Derringer Hurts Chances Of Senior Loopers

New York, July 6—(AP)—An injury to Paul Derringer of Cincinnati Reds has disturbed the personnel of the National league in tonight's major league all-star game and a 20-minute blackout of the entire Metropolitan area threatens to disturb the game's 50,000 customers.

Derringer was pushed entirely off the National's roster when he stopped a line drive with his knee in Pittsburgh yesterday. To add to the confusion, two National League officials each named a different substitute for him.

That minor difficulty will be remedied in a conference some time today.

Mayor LaGuardia has called a blackout for 9:30 p. m.—just two minutes after the deadline which the army granted the baseball officials for turning off the lights in the polo grounds. The army has ruled that the lights must be darkened one hour after sun down.

This evening's contest will start at 6:30 p. m. Ordinary ball games customarily last two hours; all-star games with their wholesale substitutions and ceremonies invariably last much longer.

It is possible that many of the 50,000 customers may still be in the stand or en route to their homes when the sirens wail. Under blackout law, no persons are allowed on the streets.

Baseball writers in the polo grounds press box, who must catch an early train to Cleveland for another charity game on Tuesday, may have to complete their stints in darkness.

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CALIFORNIA CLUB POUNDS CRATERS FOR 11 TO 5 WIN

Visitors Pull Four Double Plays and Belt Out 15 Hits—Series Divided.

Nangano Drayage of San Francisco, executing four sizzling double plays behind the five-hit hurling of Walt Hjort and pounding Steve Crippen for 15 blows including three doubles and a triple, defeated the Medford Craters 11 to 5 here yesterday to gain an even break in the two-game holiday series.

The Craters were blanked for six innings as the classy Nangano infield ripped off a quartet of twin killings to nullify the three singles Hjort yielded, but the locals managed to tally thrice in the seventh on two walks, a pair of errors and Waite's single to center.

Two more passes in the ninth, Johnny Gitzon's double to right-center and an outfield fly from the bat of Harold Lange gave the Craters their final two runs.

While Hjort was mastering the home team hitters, aided by some of the most spectacular infield play seen here in years, his mates were making life miserable for Crippen. It must be said in the red-head's behalf, however, that his defense was terrible. Although the Craters were charged with only four errors their mental blunders contributed even more to the downfall.

Defense Fails
Three singles and two walks gave the visitors a couple of runs in the first inning, two singles around a sacrifice accounted for another in the third, and eight more markers came across in the last four frames as the Crater defense cracked wide open and the Californians helped their own cause with nine base knocks.

It was a fine game for five innings, with Nangano leading 6 to 0 going into the sixth. Those four double plays, however, seemed to break the Craters' hearts, and well they might. All of them were positively sensational.

In the first inning Jack Swarwick led off with a single to right, but Third Baseman F. Ahern grabbed Worthley's smash and turned it into a two-ply slaughter.

In the third the Craters again got a man on first when Crippen walked, but Second Baseman Flynn took Swarwick's drive to his right and started another double play.

F. Ahern was the gent who again inaugurated a twin killing in the fourth. After Norm Worthley singled through the box he snatched Manager Dutch Lieber's boulder and fired to Flynn, whose throw to first nipped the skipper.

Shortstop Mullens started still another double play in the fifth, the victim being Waite following a walk to Lange.

Gitzon Hits Two
Flynn, with a triple and double and Burke and Mullens with three singles each led the visitors at the plate, while Gitzon hit a double and single for the locals.

The Craters played with a makeshift outfield, neither Al Wray nor Dwight Catherwood being on hand. Catherwood chipped two bones in his right ankle sliding into second base.
