

DEFERRED STATUS MAY BE GIVEN IN 138 OCCUPATIONS

Draft Boards Have Final Decision—List of Deferred Occupations Is Given.

Washington, July 8.—(P)—The final decision rested with local draft boards in all cases today but Chairman Paul V. McNutt of the war manpower commission has issued a list of 138 occupations defined as necessary in the war effort, in which men subject to selective service may be deferred.

The list follows:

Roosevelt Specifies New York Candidate

Washington, July 8.—(P)—President Roosevelt offered today to support any democratic

candidate for the governorship of New York who was a liberal chosen by state leaders and had supported the administration's war policies 100 per cent before Pearl Harbor. Those were qualifications for

a candidate which Representative J. Kennedy, Tammany leader, said he had received at a conference with the chief executive. And, at a press conference later Mr. Roosevelt said they were "O.K."
