**FIND BODIES OF
TWENTY MINERS**

Morgantown, W. Va., July 10—(AP)—Rescue workers early today located the bodies of 20 men in the Puriglove company's No. 2 mine, where an explosion and a fire yesterday trapped two crews of miners four and a half miles inside the workings.

Eighteen of them were tentatively identified.

Company officials said 70 of the mine's 300 employees were inside at the time of the blast and that 28 men had been definitely checked off as safe. Many others, however, began aiding the rescue work without reporting their escape.

Within a few minutes after the blast, a silent crowd, including wives and children of the trapped men, gathered to await eagerly the bits of news which rescuers might report.

**DEATH SENTENCE
GIVEN ORGANIST**

Los Angeles, July 10—(AP)—Courtney F. Rogers, slim young church organist, is sane, and must die for murdering his father and mother.

Judge Clement D. Nye pronounced death sentences on both counts yesterday immediately after the jury of 10 women and two men had returned its verdict. He did not set the date. Rogers will die in San Quentin prison's lethal chamber.

Rogers, 24, was convicted of chloroforming his mother, Lilly, 45, Feb. 10, 1941, and of asphyxiating his father, Courtney C. 54, by firing their home Oct. 25, 1941.

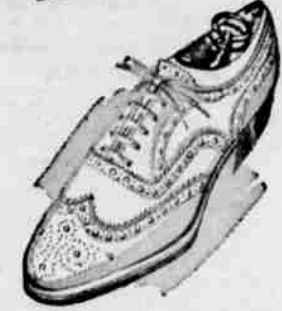
