### Boeing Tests Giant Navy Bombing Plane With Super Motors

Seattle, July 10.—(AP)—A new long-range experimental flying boat, built as a heavily armed overseas patrol bomber for the navy, made its first test flight over Lake Washington today.  
Built by the Boeing Aircraft company, which originated and now builds the flying fortress bombers for the army, the ship was described as able to carry a larger bomb load than any naval plane now in use.  
It is in the weight class of four-engine aircraft but is a two-engine airplane, with the engines believed to be the most powerful aircraft power plants now built anywhere.  
Boeing said the ship was "designed as a long range scouting and bombing plane, capable of hunting out and destroying enemy submarines and surface vessels." It is of all-metal construction and has living accommodations for a 10-man crew.  
The XPBB-1 is the first naval aircraft built by Boeing since 1933, when an experimental carrier fighter was made.

### Demand for Lumber Continues Heavy As War Output Phase

Seattle, July 10.—(AP)—The West Coast Lumbermen's association said today in its monthly report on conditions in the lumber industry that war requirements for west coast lumber continue heavy.  
"The industry is still furnishing construction lumber in large volume for building of all types," the report said. "The west coast is being called on increasingly for airplane lumber—Douglas fir, west coast hemlock, Noble fir and Port Orford cedar as well as Sitka spruce. More and more lumber is wanted and the army has announced that 275,000 tons of steel will be saved by making truck bodies of wood."  
The report showed that the weekly average of west coast lumber production in June was 176,608,000 board feet or 91.1 per cent of estimated capacity. This compared with a weekly average in May of 180,023,000 board feet.  
Cumulative production for the first 25 weeks of the year stood at 4,265,271,000 board feet compared with 4,096,925,000 board feet in the same period in 1941.
