MONDAY MEETING AT COURTHOUSE TO AIR WAR AID

Disaster preparedness and civilian war aid will be the subject of an all-day conference to be held Monday at the county courthouse auditorium, under the auspices of the American Red Cross. Seth Bullis, chairman of the local Red Cross chapter, has issued a special plea to all Red Cross volunteers concerned to attend the conference. Similar meetings have been held throughout the area in preparation for emergency.

Three meetings are scheduled in the court house here on Wednesday. The first, at 3 p. m. for all for-hire motor carriers, will be conducted by Edward J. Barry, manager of the Pacific Inland Traffic Bureau, of Portland, and Mr. Shea, with Herman O. Sites, Oregon manager for the Office of Defense Transportation participating. Following the carrier meeting, Mr. Sites and farm and dairy representatives will conduct a meeting.

At 8 p. m. a general meeting will convene in the court house auditorium, with all types of carriers, shippers, agricultural interests, and the public invited. Purpose of the meetings is to acquaint the interested parties and the public with the ODT orders and the effect of such orders on all.

It is expected that Mr. Pierce will preside at both the 3 and 8 p. m. meetings.

The sessions in other towns are scheduled for Eugene, July 13; Marshfield, July 14; Klamath Falls, July 16 and Bend, July 17.

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SOLDIERS TO AID FOREST SERVICE IF NEED ARISES

Major General Charles H. Gerhardt headquarters announced Saturday that a battalion of approximately 500 soldiers attached to the 91st Infantry Division soon to be activated at Camp White would be given training in fire prevention and stand ready at all times to aid firefighters of the Rogue River National Forest in case a serious conflagration breaks out in the forest.

This battalion, it was announced, will be formed as soon as the 91st Infantry Division is brought to full strength, and will be ready for action if needed at any time after September 1. Headquarters pointed out the formation of this firefighting battalion not only would provide needed assistance to the forest service in case of an emergency, but would act as a fine "toughening up" program for the soldiers.

Fire wardens and rangers of the Rogue River National Forest will give a series of lectures to members of the army battalion, explaining fire-fighting methods. Actual demonstrations will also be given.

STRIKE AVERTED ON STAGE LINES

Portland, Ore., July 11.—(AP) An agreement to mediate a wage dispute late today averted a strike that would have halted bus service throughout most of northwestern Oregon at midnight tonight.

Oliver Goodwin, Portland, federal labor conciliator assigned to the case today, said the agreement was reached in conferences with AFL drivers and shopworkers and Oregon Motor Stages officials.

"Operations will continue," Goodwin said. "Both parties have agreed to refer the dispute to a special mediation board." The strike threat, involving 150 employees, including all city bus drivers in Eugene and Salem was over wage demands that were not made public.

91ST DIVISION'S EMBLEM WILL BE REVIVAL FEATURE

When the famous 91st Infantry Division of World War I is re-organized at a Camp White ceremonial August 15, a 60-foot pine tree will rear itself skyward near the speaker's platform to add a touch of realism to the revival of the division, whose insignia was, and will be, a pine tree.

Major General Charles H. Gerhardt headquarters said yesterday that the Rogue River National Forest had graciously offered to present the pine tree to the division, and that the offer had been gratefully accepted.

Insignia of the old 91st, nicknamed "The Pine Tree Division," was worn on the sleeves of the left shoulder of its member, and this custom will be followed by the reorganized 91st.

The reorganization ceremony will be held in front of 91st division headquarters, and will be open to the public.

COUNTY DONATION OF RUBBER NEAR TO 700,000 MARK

The nation-wide drive for scrap rubber ended Friday night, and Jackson county's contribution to the country's stockpile will probably amount to nearly 700,000 pounds when a complete and final check is made.

Kenneth Parrett, chairman of the county petroleum committee in charge of the drive, said yesterday that 650,217 pounds had been collected and that more was still coming in. The official total will be known Monday, he said.

All scrap rubber collected in the county has been and is being stored in the bulk plants of the oil companies to await shipping orders and information, Parrett stated.

ICKES MOVES TO SPEED UP CHROME MINING STUDIES

Washington, July 11.—(AP)—Secretary Ickes has announced that the Bureau of Mines using a \$75,000 congressional appropriation had embarked on more intensive studies of processes to increase the nation's output of chromium.

He said two processes will be further studied in hope of speeding the flow of chromium to war plants. The first in a beneficiation process for low-grade ores which has successfully passed all tests made so far and has proved to merit large-scale pilot plant tests, the other is an electrolytic method for recovering high-grade chromium metal from domestic ores.

Ickes announced definite recommendations would be made for construction of commercial plants to produce the metal when final data on the tests is completed.

PORTLAND MAID WEDDED BY PROXY; MEET AFTER WAR

Vancouver, Wash., July 11.—(AP)—An American girl married an English war worker by proxy today after a six-year trans-Atlantic romance, but they won't be together until after the war.

The bride was Louisa Elizabeth Bauschardt, Portland, Ore., and the groom William John Munnings, 28, London, England (36 Elm Ave., Eastcote, Ruislip, Middlesex.)

Roy Taylor, Portland, a friend of the Bauschardt family, stood for the groom in the ceremony performed by Judge Charles W. Hall.

Miss Bauschardt met Munnings six years ago when the British subject was visiting in this country. It required four months for papers required for the ceremony to pass between here and England.

It was the second proxy marriage here in two years, the only one on record. Previously a British woman living in this country married another Englishman.
