

4 POUNDS SUGAR NOW AVAILABLE FOR STAMPS 5, 7

Portland, July 13.—(Sp.)—Sugar users by using ration stamps Nos. 5 and 7, may now purchase four pounds of sugar, the office of price administration has announced.

Stamp No. 5 is the regular stamp, good until July 25 for two pounds and stamp No. 7 is a bonus stamp, good for two additional pounds.

Stamp No. 6 which will become valid on July 26 will also be good for the purchase of two pounds.

Hobart Price, executive secretary of the Jackson county rationing board said today that certificates for canning sugar can now be handled in 15 minutes doing away with mailing of the certificates to registrants, as has been the practice.

All rationing boards have been moved to the new quarters on the top floor of the city hall enabling better efficiency on the part of the staff. Volunteer help will be appreciated. Price stated, and anyone wishing to help during the coming week may call at the office.

CHINESE FORCED TO WORK FOR JAPS

Chungking, July 13.—(AP)—Invading Japanese forces have impressed approximately 5,000,000 Chinese laborers in north China during the past five years and sent them to Manchuria and Japan to relieve an acute labor shortage, Chinese quarters reported today.

Now, these quarters declared, the Japanese are planning to conscript 2,000,000 more—of whom 1,500,000 are to be sent to Manchuria, 150,000 to Inner Mongolia and 100,000 to Japan, while the remaining 250,000 will be put to work in north China.

In order to facilitate this program the Japanese-sponsored regime in Shansi province, it was said, issued orders that 10 laborers be sent from each village "for training." The puppet government was reported planning to conscript 120,000 workers in that province alone before the end of the year.

Ernest Mott, Sr., 67, succumbed at Silverton yesterday to injuries suffered in an automobile accident Saturday night. Clyde Weatherly, 49, Eugene, died Saturday night of injuries suffered when hit by a truck. It was the first fatal accident in Eugene this year.

Portland, Ore., July 13.—(AP)—The Pacific northwest war industries commission said today that work to develop Coos Bay coal deposits for use in the fuel shortage has started.

The commission, composed of Ivan Bloch of the Bonneville administration, David Eccles representing Gov. Charles A. Sprague of Oregon, and Pat Hetherington, representing Gov. Arthur Langlie of Washington, announced a study of fuel needs in Oregon and Washington.

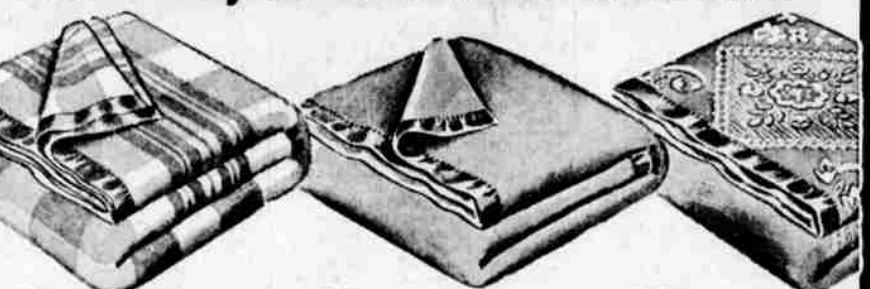

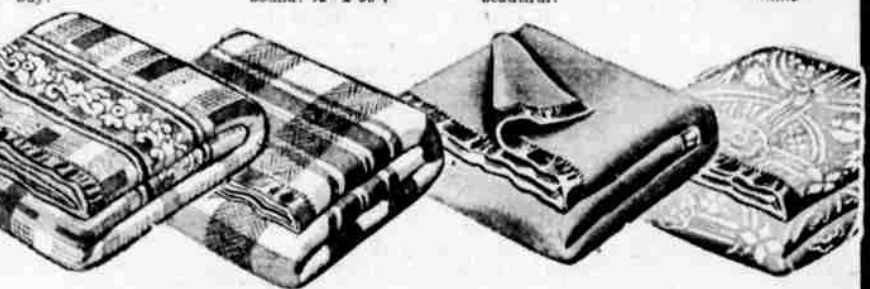
