

HOME FRONT IS EQUALLY VITAL, SAYS ELSWORTH

Economic, Political Issues
Must Be Won Also Can-
didate Tells Pro-America.

America has three vital fronts in the present world crisis—military, economic and political. This nation can win the war on the far flung battlefield, yet lose all we have built in the past 166 years by failure on either of the other two fronts.

This was the keynote of an address delivered before a meeting of Pro-America at the Hotel Holland Monday evening by Harris Ellsworth, Roseburg newspaper publisher and Republican nominee for representative of the newly-created fourth congressional district.

In an enlightening analysis of the current international situation Ellsworth reminded Pro-America members that America's military might is now being mustered and more heartening news will soon be forthcoming from various war fronts. Senseless censorship procedure of past months was derided by the speaker, who emphasized the fact that the people of this nation can "take it" and should have the bad news along with the good.

Post-war Threat Seen
The change-over of industry to war production on the economic front means that commodities previously manufactured by private funds have necessarily given way to goods made for war and financed by public funds. The post-war danger of continued federal direction of industry was pointed to as a threat against the perpetuation of the democratic system on the economic front.

"On the political front America might suffer her greatest defeat," Ellsworth told his Pro-America audience. "It is necessary in wartime to create a virtual dictatorship, yet we must make certain that the system of checks and balances which is a basic principle of American democracy is re-established when peace is achieved."

Ellsworth reminded that many powers of the legislative branch of government have passed to the executive, and that the "nine old men" of the supreme court have become "nine young men" since 1933. Judiciary support of the executive policies has steadily become more apparent.

A campaign of education in democratic principles for the youth of the nation was urged by Ellsworth as a means of dispelling the apathy of voters in local, state and national elections.

At the conclusion of his address, Mr. Ellsworth informally discussed his forth-coming election campaign with Pro-America members. He stressed his belief

that private or public power is not an issue in this election. Instead the issue is just what type of administration is to be given to public power in years to come. Answering a query from his audience as to his stand on the controversial Townsend program, Ellsworth expressed the opinion that an adequate old age pension is highly desirable providing it is economically sound and would not imperil the financial structure of the nation. If successful in the November election his attitude on any old age pension legislation would be governed by its economic soundness he said.

Mrs. C. L. Hopkins, president of Pro-America, presided at the meeting.

At noon today Ellsworth addressed the Medford Rotary club and will leave for Roseburg late today. He is accompanied by Mrs. Ellsworth.

17 STAY OUT IN LAUNDRY STRIKE

Oscar E. Gross, state organizer of the laundry workers and dry cleaning workers international union, affiliate of the A. F. L., said 17 women employees of the American Laundry were out today and that more would follow. The walkout started Monday.

"The wage and hour commission of Oregon set a minimum wage of 33 cents per hour for experienced workers on May 5, 1941," Mr. Gross said, "and today some girls are still working for 33 and 35 cents, and in a few instances a little more. That wage scale does not give the women a fair living wage today so that labor movement of Medford has and is bending every effort to adjust this condition. The laundries refused to negotiate an agreement with these workers, hence the labor trouble. The laundry workers organizer came to Medford May 5 and will stay until his problem is adjusted."

DEFERRED SERVICE FOR AIR RECRUITS

The new air force deferred service plan permits college students, now in good standing at accredited colleges and universities to finish their education, Sergeant Joseph W. Cushman, local army recruiter announced today. Those eligible to apply under this new deferred plan are: Men aged 18 to 28 inclusive who are, at the time of their enlistment, enrolled as full-time undergraduate students in college.

Anyone desiring to enlist under this plan should see Sgt. Cushman in the Post Office building.
