## BARTLETT CROP NEAR 2,300 CARS

Fruitmen said today the upcoming pear crop is "good where it is good," and "bad where it has been hit by hail and frost." The growing season is approximately three weeks behind last year, and picking and packing of Bartletts is scheduled to start between August 10 and 15. The crop is estimated at around 2300 cars, the same as last year.

No prices are expected on cannery Bartletts before the first of August. The price per ton, one packer said, would depend largely on what OPA would allow the canners to sell the canned pears at. This ceiling has not been set. He also said there would be a strong demand both for the canned and fresh pears.

The cherry harvest is now tapering off, and the yield has been good. The price was reported as somewhat better due to a southern California demand and the high quality of the cherries.

## GUIDON CEREMONY STAGED IN PARK

A large group of Medford residents witnessed the presentation of the guidon to Company A, first infantry of the Oregon State guard at the city park last evening at 8:45 o'clock. Colonel W. H. Paine presented the guidon to the officers of Company A in a brief ceremony.

## AFL UNIONS FOR SOLDIER BONUS

Wenatchee, Wash. July 15.—(P)—AFL labor unions gave quick approval today for a bonus for soldiers in the current war, when the Washington State Federation of Labor unanimously adopted a resolution calling upon congress to take immediate action to give the fighting men six months pay after the war is over.

The resolution was adopted within a few minutes after it came out of a committee hearing.

## PLANER BURNS AT PELICAN BAY MILL

Klamath Falls, Ore., July 15.—(P)—Sheriff Lloyd L. Low said today investigation had shown conclusively that the fire which burned the planing mill

of the Pelican Bay Lumber company yesterday started from a motor which operated the dry chain.

The sheriff stated all members of the night crew, which had just gone to work when the fire broke out, gave identical stories. The fire burned through the floor over the motor. The investigation, Low said, disposed of all suspicion of incendiarism in the big plant, which has been operating largely on war orders.

## FRIDAY BOND SALE TO HONOR HEROES

Jackson county will honor hundreds of county boys who are in the far-flung service of their country Friday when "American Heroes" day will be observed. W. A. Gates, county bond sales chairman announced today. He said that this is an opportunity for residents to honor heroes with action and not words—by purchase of bonds and stamps to back the boys at the front.

Mr. Gates explained it will be an opportunity for country residents to honor all men who are participating in this tremendous fight for the safety of democracy. He urged all to cooperate.
