LISKA SCATTERS NINE KNOCKS IN OPENING FRAGAS

Orrell and Fitzke Fling Second Fray—Leading Solons Beaten by Angels.

The Portland Beavers are apparently tired of running along behind the Pacific Coast league baseball pack.
The inspiration of playing before home fans may have something to do with it, but whatever the explanation, the Beavers are making their bid to finish the season out of the cellar.
Last Night, the Portlanders noosed out Oakland by one-run margins in two abbreviated games. The first game went seven innings and ended 3 to 2, while the second contest ended in the fifth, 8 to 7, because of the league rule that forbids starting an inning of play after 11:50 p. m.
Oakland collected nine safeties off Ad Liska in the opener as Henry Phippen held the Beavers to five hits, but the breaks were with the winners.
Win Early
Portland batters recovered in the second game to pound out four hits for a five-run lead in the first inning. In all the Beavers collected 11 hits to 10 for the Oaks, who nearly won out in a last inning rally in which they scored three runs on five hits.
Each of the other league games were decided by one-run margins.
The second-place Los Angeles Angels used a four-run rally in the fifth to nose out the Sacramento Solons, league pacesetters, 6 to 5. The win put the Angels within a game and one half of the Solons.
San Diego, playing at San Francisco, also outdid the Seals 9 safeties to 7, but dropped a decision 3 to 2 as the host team took advantage of a few lucky breaks.
Hollywood was kept idle by a postponement at Seattle, but the teams make up the lost game in a doubleheader tonight.

Whirley May Top Seabiscuit Money Mark In Race Today

Boston, July 15.—(P)—Whirlaway may give the horse laugh to the so-called Seabiscuit if he can change his stride and break near the top today in the \$50,000-added Massachusetts handicap.
The four-year-old son of the English Derby-winning Blenheim II needs only \$27,244 to equal the record earnings of \$437,730 that Seabiscuit piled up during his six years of campaigning.
And he can get it today if he can outfoot seven rivals to the wire for the \$44,850 winner's share of the richest purse of the current season for handicap horses.
The long-tailed Whirly, owned by the wealthy Warren Wright, the Kentucky and Chicago horsebreeder, happens to be a stretch runner of great fame. But all the previous Massachusetts—seven in all—have been gained by thoroughbreds that possessed the ability of breaking fast from the box and maintaining their advantage to the wire.
Whirly is going to tangle with some real speed. The wizard-like touch of Sunny Jim Fitzsimmons has Apache, latest challenger to three-year-old honors, right up where he might go out in front and pile up such a big lead that "Mr. Bigtail" may find himself too far back to gain his golden goal, especially since Whirly is packing the top weight of 130 pounds, and Sunny Jim's baby is lugging only 107.
If Apache does not crowd Whirly, it could be Mrs. Packer Corning's Attention, or Likely, Emerson Woodward's New England favorite, Rounders, and then again there is a slight chance that the early-breaking Transfigure, owned by Texan John L. Sullivan, may last and burst home to take all.

RAY STARR DROPS THREE-HITTER AS PLAYERS COLLIDE

Phils Nip Reds, 2-1 on Freak Play — Novikoff Stars as Cubs Whip Giants.

The secret of successful pitching sometimes seems to be luck as much as skill.
Yesterday Ray Starr, the lean spellbinder of the Cincinnati Reds, pitched three-hit ball and was beaten 2-1 by the pitiful Phils because two outfielders collided under a fly hit by Pitcher Frank (Rube) Melton and the ball fell for a home run.
On the other hand Vern Olsen, the Chicago Cubs' southpaw, was pummeled for 11 hits by the New York Giants and not only escaped with his sixth straight victory but scored a shutout, 3-0.

Starr's misfortune came in the fifth inning just after his teammates had given him a 1-0 lead. The 36-year-old rookie had walked Catcher Benny Warren of the Phils and then Melton lifted a long fly to left center. Outfielders Max Marchall and Harry Craft raced for it and knocked each other to the ground. The ball rolled away for a homer and time had to be called—and stretchers, too—before the game could continue.
At Chicago the Giants got men on base in every inning and made hits in the first eight, but they never were able to break through Olsen for a run. The Cubs made three less hits off two New York pitchers, but Lou Novikoff singled home two tallies in the fifth and the Cubs scored in the eighth on two singles—one of the scratchy sort.

Cards Win
At St. Louis Mort Cooper had luck of a different sort. He was batted out of the box for the third time in succession, but the Cardinals rallied spectacularly to beat the Boston Braves, 7-5, in 11 innings.
Brooklyn punished the Pittsburgh Pirates 5-1 with Whitlow Wyatt pitching three-hit ball for his tenth triumph of the year in a night game that drew 21,254 fans at Pittsburgh.
Wyatt's path was made easy when Billy Herman doubled with the bases loaded in the first inning for three runs.
In the American league, the Detroit Tigers 3-0 on the two-hit hurling of rookie Hank Borowy and extended their first place margin to six games as the Boston Red Sox absorbed another beating by the St. Louis Browns, 3-2.
