

LIONS ADDRESSED BY CHAPLAIN REIN OF CANTONMENT

Chaplain E. A. Rein of Camp White addressed the Lions' club noon meeting Wednesday at Hotel Medford. Chaplain Rein, who is a major and commanding chaplain at the camp, stated that stress is being given spiritual development among trainees throughout the posts of the nation. A new departure, as compared with World War I, is the erection of chapels, and the giving of the chaplains' almost undivided attention to spiritual matters.

"A vigorous and efficient army," he said, "is dependent upon good moral conduct, which is being thoroughly recognized by our leaders. Efforts are being taken to make it easier for the man in service to lead a moral and spiritual life."

"Spiritual leadership is provided with the thought of avoiding all sectarianism, within different religious faiths. Worship facilities are provided for all our large groups, such as Protestant, Jewish and Catholic."

"A chaplain's duties include maintenance of high morale insofar as his contacts will permit; to put at ease the minds of recruits who may be worrying about domestic or personal matters; to provide a spiritual tonic to all who will accept it." Chaplain Rein said oftentimes it was not the soldier whose problem was greatest, but that of the wife and children left at home.

The chaplain spoke highly of the moral standards he had encountered in his previous assignments and in reports he had gathered from camps elsewhere.

Indoor tennis sets, reading tables, card tables, old chairs, sofas—things that might be rehabilitated—are needed for the camp recreational rooms until such time as the army can provide them with standard equipment, the chaplain said.

Vice President Clifford Proctor opened the meeting. Llon Rev. "Rube" Coleman introduced the speaker. A change in the hour and place of meeting for next Wednesday was announced. It will be held in the evening at 6:30 at the Pit, and will include members only.

FIRE LOOKOUTS AND GUARDS FOR APPLEGATE

Big Applegate, July 16.—(Spl.)—With one new lookout and a larger staff of lookouts and fire guards than ever before, the Applegate district stands ready to face the fire season with 22 watchers stationed in the mountains and at the Star ranger station. This doesn't include a fire suppression crew of 16 men stationed on Star gulch. Local farmers also have been signed up as emergency fire fighters.

The ranger station personnel under Ranger L. C. Port includes the following local men: Jack Crump, district guard; H. J. Pennings (Portland), protective assistant; John Byrne, fire prevention guard; Morris Byrne, Star fireman; Jim Winingham, suppression crew foreman.

Lookouts include Bob Corthell of Ashland at Mt. Ashland; Bob Dunn of Ashland at Wagner Butte; Adrian Parry of Yreka, Tallowbox; Paul Stribran of Applegate at Anderson Butte; Warren C. Adams of Jacksonville at Dutchman's Peak; Fred W. Buehling of Ashland at Windy Peak; Wayne Boyd of Eugene at Steve's Peak.

The new lookout post is at Slick Ear Peak in Beaver Creek area, and is manned by Merton LeRoy of this community, who will be a lookout fireman. Other guards and lookout firemen include Richard C. Mangnall of Illinois, at Cinnabar; Charles W. McCoy of Wagner Creek, at Brickpile; Lee Hayes of Medford, at Little Applegate; W. H. Zeigler of Applegate, at Perk's Pasture; Harold Von Stein of Butte Creek, at Fir Glade; Woody Mason at Middle Fork; Howard Griffin of Medford, at Thompson Creek; Robert Dowell of Sheridan at Sturgis, and T. J. Norby of Ashland, at Ashland.

JACK HENDERSON NOW A SERGEANT

Jack Prescott Henderson, stationed in Australia with the U. S. army air force, was recently promoted to the rank of sergeant, according to word received here by his grandmother, Mrs. Edith Prescott of 846 East Ninth street.

Sgt. Henderson, who enlisted in December of 1940, is the grandson of the late George Prescott, Medford city policeman who was killed by L. A. Banks, local newspaper editor

now serving a life sentence in the Oregon state penitentiary. Following his enlistment he was stationed at Hamilton Field until sent to Australia last January.

Sgt. Henderson attended grade and junior high school in Medford, and was graduated from high school in Salem. His mother, Mrs. George Francis, resides in Portland. His father, a veteran of the first world war, died shortly after the armistice.

erty and the amount he himself had invested in it.
