TRUCK TIPS OVER IN MID-ASHLAND

Ashland, July 16.—(Spl.)—Milton Richard May, 17-year-old driver of a lumber truck, narrowly escaped serious injury when his truck, loaded with finished lumber which he was hauling from Central Point, turned over at the Plaza corner Wednesday afternoon.

May stated that when he started around the curve he realized that the five foot stack of lumber of his truck was slipping and he made a hasty retreat from the truck cab, shutting off the switch before he started crawling out.

When the truck had reached the pedestrian crossing directly in front of the entrance to the city recorder's office and turned over, May was on the running board. His only injury were scratches received when his head hit the rear-view mirror on the right side of the truck.

The truck was carrying slightly more than 9,000 feet of lumber, May stated, and was being hauled from the Mt. Pitt Lumber company, south of Ashland, where it was to be recut.

TOT DROWNS IN WELL

BIG U. S. BOMBERS ATTACK BENGASI IN DAYLIGHT RAID

Bombing One Phase of Continuing Battle on Western Desert—Rommel Retreats

Cairo, July 16.—(P)—Heavy bombers of the United States army air forces made a daylight attack on the axis base of Bengasi, Libya, yesterday, starting a large dock fire.

The bombing was one phase of the continuing battle of the western desert, in which RAF and allied airmen attacked Bengasi and Tobruk, both far west of the fighting zone, and attacked the axis armies "in force" at the front.

On the ground the German-Italian forces of Marshal Erwin Rommel were reported to be giving ground on the central front west of El Alamein, but British headquarters acknowledged that the Germans had achieved some gains in the coastal zone and "partially succeeded" in reestablishing themselves at Tel El Elia.

British Move Up
As the result of an attack launched before dawn yesterday, British troops pushed forward in the central sector to secure objectives at the western end of a ridge south of El Alamein, a communique said.

"Prisoners were taken, but their numbers are not known," the bulletin added.

The assault apparently was launched to relieve pressure on Australian forces holding recently-won positions at Tel El Elia—the "Hill of Jesus"—and evidently was at least partly successful, for the communique announced that imperial troops continued to hold high ground in that area.

Enemy forces which succeeded in occupying positions at Tel El Elia Tuesday night were heavily bombed all day yesterday by British artillery and planes and a number of axis tanks were knocked out of action, the bulletin reported.

PORTLAND SHORT OF PORK SUPPLY
Portland, July 16.—(P)—Hyman Cohen, Journal market editor, reported today that Portland virtually is without fresh pork supplies.

He said that ceiling prices combined with refusal of dealers to ship dressed hogs here for sale at low levels when the federal government is paying higher prices for live stuff has nearly eliminated supplies here.

Near record prices prevailed on the Portland market today, with prime stuff bringing \$14.75 a hundred, up 10 cents from yesterday. Some very heavy packing sows brought \$11.75, the highest price on record for this quality.

To feed an army of 3 1/2 million men, 20 million pounds of food must daily be purchased, shipped, tabulated and issued.
