BEAT SCHEDULE IN ENGINES FOR FIGHTER PLANES

Packard Building Rolls Royce Engines Far Faster Than Schedule Calls For.

Detroit (AP)—Building engines for fighter planes is a far more

intricate undertaking than turning out engines for passenger cars, according to engineers of the Packard Motor company.

Nearly two years ago the company took the job to build Rolls Royce engines in volume quantities.

Production schedules already have been exceeded, a staggering achievement in view of the gigantic proportions of preparatory work. Packard had to re-draw completely a stack of 2,500 English-type blueprints, changing metric measurements into inches, and design and install 3,400 new machines.

Takes 67 Hours

According to Packard engine experts, here are some of the reasons why it is more difficult

to build an airplane engine: Its airplane engine has between 10,000 and 11,000 parts against 7,140 in an entire 1942-model car.

It takes 35 hours to machine a Rolls airplane engine connecting rod, against 30 minutes for a passenger-car engine rod.

It takes 62 hours to complete an aircraft cylinder block. The same job on a car block requires 7.7 hours.

A Rolls crankshaft requires 67 hours against only 3.3 for that of a car. Incidentally, the cost of a Rolls Royce airplane crankshaft alone exceeds the cost of an entire car engine.

A Rolls engine has 72 gears; a motor car engine has five or six.

Engines Built for PT's
Finally, it takes 194 hours to assemble a Rolls aircraft engine, plus 228 extra hours for tear-down and rebuild before it can be placed in a fighter plane. It takes only five hours to assemble one of the finest passenger-car engines.

In building the Rolls engine, Packard took a hand production job and placed it on a moving assembly line basis. At the same time, it reached quantity production on engines for the powerful Navy PT boats, an achievement for which it has received the Navy "E" flag. These boats helped sink Japanese ships in Subic bay and Cebu and took Gen. Douglas MacArthur from the besieged Philippines.

This is a lesson in shopping that's worth reading

Because the war has made "time" more precious than ever before, it has become practically a patriotic duty to streamline our daily schedules as much as possible. This means our food buying habits must change. For one of the best ways to save time is to cut shopping trips down by planning menus and market lists a week in advance. These suggestions from the Safeway Homemakers' Bureau should help you in your planning.

Perishability is the best guide for dividing up your purchases. Staples like flour, salt, potatoes, canned and packaged goods can be bought weeks in advance. It's wise to replace them as soon as they're used, so you won't be caught short and, too, so you won't have to carry huge armloads at the end of the week.

Extra-heavy purchases can be saved for times when you'll have your car or can share a neighbor's, lightening your bundles on other days. And another thing, enough citrus fruits, bacon, coffee, butter, and eggs can be bought all in one trip to last a week or more. With these purchases out of the way early in the week, then you'll need to think only about buying perishable foods.

Foods that will keep 3 to 4 days without spoiling include most meats; vegetables like carrots, turnips, beets, parsnips, squash, egg plant, corn, tomatoes; most under-ripe fruits and the like. Buying these foods in advance saves extra shopping trips.

The most perishable foods, those which will keep only a day or two, are fresh green and leafy vegetables; ripe fresh fruits; fresh fish, chicken, and ground meats; milk and fresh dairy products; bread, cake, pastry.



To get your money's worth in vitamins and minerals, use fresh leafy and green vegetables the same day you buy them. As soon as you get them home, wash them quickly in a small amount of water, drain, and keep them in a covered container in the refrigerator until just ready to use. Don't pare or cut the vegetables until just time to cook or serve. Exposure to warm air, soaking in water, and cutting vegetables all tend to cause loss of vitamins and minerals.
