

## JUDGE TOUVELLE GIVES LAND FOR ARMY SWIM POOL

Swimming facilities in the cool waters of the Rogue river have been made available to Camp White's military personnel through the cooperation of Judge F. L. Touvelle, public spirited citizen of Jacksonville. It was announced Saturday from headquarters of Colonel Owen R. Meredith, camp commander.

Judge Touvelle has provided sufficient land for this purpose at a point near Bybee bridge, where the beach is smooth and sandy and the current is not too swift to be hazardous, Colonel Meredith's headquarters stated. It was added that the location was ideal for swimming.

Included in the facilities are safety ropes and rafts, life preservers, diving boards, dressing quarters and sanitary conveniences. The swimming area is approximately 200 yards below Bybee bridge, and it was announced that bathing suits would be worn.

Qualified lifeguards will be provided by Camp White and all organizations using the facilities and an officer will be in charge at all times. Diving from any part of the bridge will be prohibited.

Officers and soldiers have been cautioned that the Rogue river is just what the name implies and to exercise the utmost caution at all times.

## SECOND PERIOD OF BOY CAMP OPENS

The Boy Scout camp at Lake o' Woods will open for the second period Monday, again at full capacity, according to Kenneth Wells, Crater Lake area executive, who spent Saturday in Medford arranging for arrival of the new contingent of Scouts. The camp houses 105, including boys and staff.

Mr. Wells reported the camp this year one of the most successful ever held. There has been no illness, no accidents and weather conditions and camp life in general have been ideal, he said.

The final period will open July 26 and registration for this time is only two-thirds full, the area executive said. Boys wishing to enjoy the camping opportunity should make application at Scout headquarters near the Bear creek bridge.

## PACKING SCHOOL REGISTRY OPEN

Registration for the 1942 pear packing school is progressing satisfactorily according to officials in charge of the school. Anyone living in southern Oregon interested in learning to qualify as a packer is urged to get in touch with any local packing house. Applications are also available at the principal's office in the Medford senior high school on South Oakdale or at the city school superintendent's office in the city hall.

Mrs. Mary Lou Vorheis, who has had successful experience as an instructor and supervisor of packing schools, will be in charge of instruction.

The school will be held at Pinnacle plant number 2 on South Front and Fourteenth streets. Southern Oregon residents 18 years of age or older are eligible to enroll.

## PROMOTION GIVEN CAPTAIN VAN ROO

Captain Robert VanRoo, ordnance officer of the 91st Infantry Division at Camp White, Friday became the first officer of the division to receive a promotion from the war department.

Captain VanRoo, according to Major General Charles H. Gerhardt's headquarters, was advanced to the rank of major. He reported for duty at Camp White July 8, after serving as an instructor in the ordnance school at the United States military academy at West Point.

## LOWE WILL HEAD BUTTE F. BOARD

Another deputy sugar board has been set up, this time at Butte Falls, under the supervision of Harry L. Lowe, superintendent of Butte Falls schools. Hobart Price, executive secretary of Jackson county rationing board announced yesterday.

Price stated that the rationing board hopes to set up boards in other outlying districts such as Trail, Rogue River, Gold Hill and Ruch. At present deputy boards are located at Central Point, Jacksonville and Butte Falls.

He also issued a call for 30 to 40 volunteer workers for filing Tuesday and Wednesday at the rationing board office on the top floor of the city hall. Girl Scouts and others with filing experience are needed for those two days Price explained. He said the board is "grateful to the many ladies and Girl Scouts who have been helping us but we are still in need of 30 to 40 volunteer workers to file sugar ration cards." Filing will make it possible for more efficient help on the part of the board employees or for transferring of cards to another board.

Anyone who did not receive enough sugar on their first application for rationing may secure a second application for the needed amount at this or any time, Price said.

## MEMORIAL PICNIC GROUND PLANNED

Dedicated to members of the old 91st Infantry Division who lost their lives in World War I, a 91st Infantry Division memorial picnic ground is being constructed on the Camp White reservation at Government bridge, about a mile and a half up Rogue river from Bybee bridge. General Charles H. Gerhardt's headquarters said yesterday.

The picnic area, which will be large enough to accommodate a battalion of soldiers at one time, will include barbecue pits, cooking grates, rustic tables and several small docks for fishing boats. All work is being done by troops at the camp.

## VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL TO OPEN T'VILLE TOMORROW

Vacation Bible School at the Jacksonville Presbyterian church opens Monday at 9 a. m. for a two hour session daily for the coming six days. Children from five to 13 years of age are invited to the school, regardless of denomination. The Rev. and Mrs. Lawrence Mitchellmore will be in charge, assisted by a staff of competent teachers.

Cards were sent to a number of children during the past week but those not receiving cards are also invited to participate in the summer Bible school. This is the first Bible school held in Jacksonville for several years and it is expected that 35 to 50 children will attend, it was stated.

General theme of the school is "Life of Christ" with Bible drama, memory work, music and crafts. Each day a different phase of the "Life of Christ" will be studied. The program includes: Monday, "Why Jesus Came to Earth"; Tuesday, "Jesus As a Child"; Wednesday, "Jesus in Church"; Thursday, "Jesus at Work"; Friday, "What Jesus Thought About God"; Saturday, "Jesus in the World Today".

Friday evening a Vacation Bible school graduation will be held to which parents and friends are invited. Diplomas will be presented to those with five-day perfect attendance and certificates to others. The school will be climaxed Saturday with a picnic on the church lawn.

## MILK PRICES SET FOR CAMP SALES

Minimum wholesale milk and cream prices have been set for the Camp White sales area, according to notices received here of Official Order No. 206 from the Oregon Milk Control board. The price fixing follows a public hearing held here February 25 when testimony was received pertaining to creation of a pool to supply fluid milk for military purposes.

Effective August 1, minimum milk prices in the Camp White area, as set by the board, include:

Legal to 4.2%, quarts, wholesale 11c; retail 13c; gallons 44c and 32c.

4.2% to 5.2%, quarts, wholesale 12c; retail 14c; gallons 48c and 56c.

Cream prices: 18 to 22%, quarts, wholesale 50c; retail 55c; 32 to 35%, 68c and 73c.

## M'GINTY REPORTS SOLDIERS ROBBED HIM; PAIR HELD

Hugh McGinty of Jacksonville was slugged and robbed Friday night about 11:30 o'clock by two soldiers, according to city police reports. The incident occurred in the railroad yards near Eighth street and McGinty reported about \$10 taken from his pockets.

City police said Saturday that McGinty met the soldiers, Sergeant William O. Owens and Technical Sergeant James J. McAtee, in a local beer parlor. Later the three decided to go to another beer establishment and while walking through the railroad yards McGinty was slugged from behind by one of the soldiers.

Sergeants Owens and McAtee were being held in the city jail yesterday pending transfer to the county jail. They were arrested in a local beer establishment by military police and city police later Friday night. McGinty was taken to Community hospital where he received medical treatment for injuries to his head.

## CODDING RESIGNS DEMOCRATIC POST

George A. Coddling, newly-appointed special attorney for the government in connection with the acquisition of land for Camp White and other Oregon defense projects, announced his resignation yesterday as chairman of the Jackson County Democratic Central Committee.

Coddling, who was recently elected county chairman by a unanimous vote, explained that the Hatch act prohibited federal officials from holding office in any political organization.

A new county chairman will be named at a meeting at 212 Liberty building Monday at 8 p. m., called by Dr. E. W. Barnum, secretary. Leading Democrats of the county are urging the election of Ward B. Spatz, who has previously served as Democratic Central Committee chairman.

## MOTT INTRODUCES BIRTH DATA BILL

Washington, July 18—(P)—A bill to authorize the census bureau to furnish birth certificates to citizens unable to obtain them was presented to the house this week by Rep. Mott (R-Ore.).

Mott asserted present laws provide that government jobs are available only to citizens and that no one could be employed by a private firm doing government work unless he be a citizen.

Under the measure anyone not able to prove his American birth by records may apply to the census bureau for a certified birth record.
