

HOLMAN CHARGES COAST'S DEFENSE CRIMINALLY POOR

Obsolete, Inadequate, Poorly Distributed is Word of Senator on Visit West.

Salem, July 22. — (P) — U. S. Senator Rufus C. Holman (R-Ore.) said today that the defense of the Pacific coast are "criminally obsolete, woefully inadequate and poorly distributed."

Holman, a member of a special senate sub-committee appointed to investigate west coast and Alaska defenses, blamed President Roosevelt and his subordinates who, Holman said, "are more concerned with the plight of the people of Iraq and Iran than the safety of their folks here at home."

He charged that the guns at Fort Stevens could not reply to the Japanese submarine which shelled the Fort Stevens reservation June 21 because they are of 1898 vintage and lacked range.

Planes All Away
Holman said there were no naval planes at Tongue Point, because they were "all away on an undisclosed mission." He said further that army bombers at the Portland air base did not attack the submarine because the base was not notified of the attack until several hours after it was over.

Senator Holman said army air forces in the northwest are "grossly inadequate."

He denied he is an isolationist, asserting he is a nationalist, who believes that adequate preparation for war is the greatest insurance against war.

He said the sub-committee would start its investigations in a few days, visiting every military installation on the Pacific and Alaskan coasts.

Jehovah Witnesses Hamper War Effort Say K. F. Carpenters

Klamath Falls, Ore., July 22. — (P) — Activities of Jehovah's Witnesses were vigorously condemned before the city council here last night by the Carpenters' local, 190, of the American Federation of Labor.

The carpenters, whose action was endorsed by the Central Labor Council, charged the religious cult is refusing to support the war effort. They asked the council to take steps to "hinder and prevent" Witness activities, such as the distribution of tracts and playing of phonograph records on the front porches of unwilling listeners.

In a statement to the council, the unionists urged that Jehovah's Witnesses be classed as "the most disrespectful element among the conscientious objectors and be looked upon with scorn and disapproval."

Alaska Censorship Slapped by Mayor Of Far North Town

Portland, July 22. — (P) — "Wouldn't America rather know step-by-step that the Japanese are conquering the Aleutians than to hear all at once that all Alaska is gone?" Mayor J. W. Fletcher of Unalaska, Alaska, asked today in flaying the rigid censorship on Alaska war news.

In an interview, Mayor Fletcher said: "Where it makes sense where there's even the least thread of chance that the enemy doesn't have certain information, censorship is desirable. The Japanese knew they were there... and they knew we knew it because they had contacted our planes. Yet the public was kept in ignorance."

Capturing Alaska is far different than conquering continental United States, he said. "Take Dutch Harbor, Fairbanks, Nome and one or two other small towns and Alaska is lost," he said.

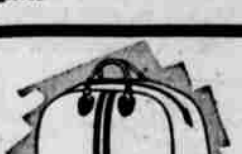

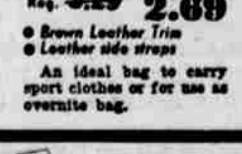

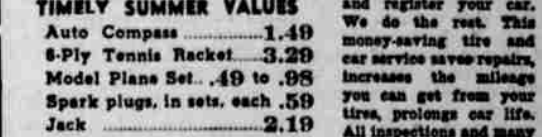
