ARTISTS IN ARMY STUDY METHODS TO DECEIVE FOE

Camouflage in Philippines Caused Japanese to Waste Tons of Munitions

Fort Ord, Cal. (U.P.)—Hundreds of former artists of all types are studying—and practicing—here the latest means of making the enemy think we are where we aren't and that we aren't where we are.

General MacArthur reported from the Philippines that the Japanese were wasting tons of ammunition on dummy installations, while real gun positions, carefully camouflaged, were left to blast away at the invaders.

So rapid are advances in camouflage technique that it is impossible to keep a manual up to date, local officers explain. As a result, the units here not only follow standard principles but experiment on new methods of fooling the axis.

Chicken wire, fish net, heavy wood mauls, and paint and spray outfits are the chief tools of camouflage units trained here. When the men are proficient in their work they will be sent to infantry, artillery and other units to train more camouflage men and to supervise concealment of installations.

Use Dummy Rocks
Two men who pioneered modern camouflage technique are stationed in this area. Col. John Ohmer is with the Western Defense command in San Francisco, and Major William Mohr commands a newly activated at Ord.

Visitors to Major Mohr's outfit find literal proof of the adage, "You can't believe your eyes." Wearing "zoot" suits, the name given newly perfected sniper suits by the camouflage contingent, soldiers hide in what should be plain sight and then dare observers to find them. They jump from behind dummy rocks and fool photographers as they have passing aviators—with a dummy bomber.

Pvt. Robert Steenberg, a former lithograph artist; Pvt. Stewart Sproul, former art director of Public Theaters; and Pvt. William Tilton, former background artist at the Walt Disney studios, are among the men in the unit here. Tilton designed Casey Jones, Jr., the train, and the clowns in "Dumbo."

Study Butterflies
Many of the men formerly drew high salaries, but now they are devoting their energies to army work, much of it strenuous physical labor. Males are the chief tools of a camouflage outfit. They resemble huge croquet mallets.

Rattle-dazzle designs used for camouflage in World War I have been replaced by the soft, blending tones of artistic deception. Sometimes camouflaged hide-aways are dug right in the middle of the road. The man inside waits until he hears a tank or other vehicle pass overhead, then heaves his grenade at it.

Half-ton trucks are given papier mache tank-shaped coverings with which to fool the enemy. Many of the camouflage troops have visited the nearby Pacific Grove museum of natural history, where one of the greatest
