Billy Hulen Says:

"Dickinson Day" Slated Sunday; General on Hand

Pvt. Joseph Dickinson of Cedarville, N. J., the gentleman who is currently pitching and batting the Medford Craters to what is expected to become an Oregon-California league pennant three weeks hence, if not sooner, is going to be honored with a "day" next Sunday afternoon at the fairgrounds ball-yard.

As an expression of their gratitude to the big righthander for the herculean work he has been doing in the battle down the home stretch, the board of directors of the Medford Athletic association has designated next Sunday, when the Craters clash with the Dorris (Cal.) Lumberjacks in the second game of their two-game series, as "Joe Dickinson Day."

And, as a feature of the "day," Major General Charles H. Gerhardt, commander of the 91st infantry division at Camp White, will present to Joe a gift from the Medford Athletic association. A major general, himself a great baseball player and all-around athlete while at West Point, will stand beside another grand ball player, a private, and place in his hands a token of the esteem in which he is held by the "front office."

Local fans and fannettes, who have watched Joe mow down enemy hitters, knock in run after run for his own team, field his position in flawless style and contribute that pitching strength the Craters needed to forge into a full two-game lead over the Klamath Falls Pelicans, will also have the opportunity of making their contribution to the quiet, likeable "ball player's ball player."

A box will be placed at the entrance to the grandstand and U. S. legal tender placed there will be collected and the "purse" handed over to Joe, probably along about the seventh inning. And friends, that box oughta be filled to overflowing.

While it is sometimes bad for team morale to single out a certain player and accord him most of the credit for a club's success—especially in semi-pro ball where the performers work on a gratis basis—we don't think any of the Craters will begrudge Joe the plaudits we are giving him.

Joe joined the Craters when the pitching situation was becoming very bleak. Manager Dutch Lieber's arm had just gone sour on him. Lefty Al Wimer was having trouble with his control and only Steve Crippen, released last week-end to Grants Pass, was available for regular duty. Joe stepped in, with the Craters and Klamath tied for the lead, and since then has won five and lost one. Now, instead of the locals and Pelicans being tied, the Medfords are two games out front with only six to play—a big, beautiful lead.

Not alone has Joe done yeoman's work on the mound. He is hitting a terrific .481, tops for all Crater batsmen, and plenty of those blows have chased runners across the plate.

Especially appropriate is the designation of next Sunday as "Joe Dickinson Day," for at that time the Craters will play the team that Joe, on July 18 and 19, defeated twice as many days. That week-end is the highlight of Joe's career with the Craters. He whipped the "Jacks," 10 to 4 in a twilight game Saturday, then came right back the next afternoon to fling eight frames and receive credit for the 17 to 9 Medford victory.

In civilian life Joe is a professional baseball player, the property of the Chicago Cubs. The 26-year-old soldier spent last season with Milwaukee in the American association and Madison in the Three-Eye league. When the war is over Joe plans to take up where he left off, working at the job he loves, the job of playing baseball, but right now he is engaged in a greater task. The task of whipping the axis.

The baseball he pitches for the Craters represents his recreation while in the army. And brother, this town is lucky that Joe happens to be stationed here. "Joe Dickinson Day" will afford everybody the opportunity of showing Joe just how glad we are that he is on duty in Medford.

Dickinson, with three hits in four trips against Grants Pass Saturday night, raised his batting average from .435 to .481 to take over the individual Crater clubbing lead. The averages follow:

Byron Nelson Crushes Clayton Heafner for 'Shanter Title'

CHAMPION FIRES 5-UNDER-PAR 67 IN PLAYOFF DUEL

Heafner, Shooting 71, Leads Only Once—Eagle on Fifth Turning Point.

Chicago, July 28—(AP)—Byron Nelson, one of the greatest of modern linksmen was home-ward bound today with \$2,500 in his hip pocket, once again having demonstrated that when the big money is on the line he is unbeatable.

The demonstration came as the grand finale to that golfing circus known as the Tam O'Shanter \$15,000 open tournament.

Yesterday Nelson crushed big Clayton Heafner of Durham, N. C., by four strokes in their 18-hole playoff for the championship of the dizziest of all golf events. The pair had tied at the end of the regular 72 holes, with totals of 280.

As though to atone for his unaccountable lapse of the previous day, when he soared to an inglorious 77 on the fourth round, the ex-Texas took Tam O'Shanter's soggy acres apart with a 67—five under par—to send Heafner down for the count.

Not that Heafner weakened. The big fellow stayed in there gamely all the way to score his 71.

Aside from his one terrible round, Nelson shot these scores at Tam O'Shanter: 67-71-65-67-270.

Yesterday Nelson was out in 33, back in 34. He was down to Heafner only once during the play-off. Two up at the turn, he was converting it into a rout toward the close.

Probably the match was decided as early as the fifth hole where Nelson, already 1-up, blasted into the hole from about 35 feet for an eagle two to beat Heafner's birdie three. After that experience Heafner must have realized it was no use.

MCDONALD LOSES TO "THE ANGEL" IN 15 MINUTES

Sockeye Jack McDonald knows now what it's like to grapple a mountain of granite. For 15 minutes he tugged and heaved and threw his 213 pounds against the hulking frame of Maurice "The Angel" Tillet in the main event of last night's armory mat program, and when it was all over the net result was: McDonald, no falls; "The Angel," two falls.

Sockeye, himself quite a man, couldn't do a thing with the 273-pound Tillet, who certainly lived up to his reputation as being "the world's ugliest wrestler," and one of the toughest.

Not only did McDonald fail to budge Tillet with his Sunday de luxe shots, but he actually knocked himself goofy trying to sonnenburg the French monstrosity to the canvas.

This incredible operation occurred after the pair had traded clouds and arm holds for 15 minutes, with the overflow crowd roaring futile encouragement to McDonald. Sockeye fired a Gropkick to "The Angel's" button, and wound up on the seat of his own pants.

Changing his tactics, McDonald then rebounded off the ropes and sent himself crashing head-on into the bulging stomach of Mr. Tillet. A moment later Sockeye was clawing at the canvas, having, for a moment, no interest in the proceedings. He had knocked himself plumb goofy on that cast-iron "Angel" torso.

This was the signal for Tillet to create his first fall. He waited until McDonald had climbed shakily to his feet, then grabbed him in his famous bear hug and powered him to the mat for a press and fall.

Still shaken to the soles of his feet, McDonald dropped the next tumble three minutes after the gong. Somehow he managed to hoist "The Angel" to his shoulders for what, apparently, was to be a body slam, but it was too great an effort. Slowly Sockeye's leg gave way under him, down he went with Tillet in the saddle, and that was all there was to it. Tillet merely lay on top of the weary McDonald while Referee Earl Yockley tolled off the count.

Tillet wasn't very active, but he didn't have to be. He waddled around the ring taking everything Sockeye tossed his way, and occasionally throwing short jolts at McDonald's chin that rocked the latter back on his heels. He was simply too powerful and too rugged for his lighter opponent.

Joe Corbett defeated Pete Belcastro in the middle event when Pete, with the falls standing one each, didn't wait for the fifth-round bell to start his rough stuff. He rushed from his corner and proceeded to work Corbett over, with the result that Joe was awarded the fall and match on a foul.

Corbett employed a press to take the first fall in the third round, and Belcastro used punches and a press to even the score in the fifth.

Irish Jim Casey took the lone fall of his match with Pedro Brazil, using a reverse Japanese scissors and a press in the fourth and final round to gain the tumble.

Promoter Mack Lillard announced there would be no more matches here for the next two or three weeks.

PCL ATTENDANCE UNDER LAST YEAR

Los Angeles, July 28—(AP)—Pacific Coast league attendance is running about 150,000 behind that of 1941, but the Los Angeles club shows an increase of 20 per cent, and will play to 500,000 persons by the end of the season, President Clarence (Pats) Rowland says.

The increase in home attendance at Wrigley field so far is 32 per cent, with 210,000 admissions or \$1,000 more than last year at this date.

On the road the league-leading Angels have drawn 162,000, more than 11,000 over 1941.

GOVERNMENT PAY HIKE WAITS ROOSEVELT PEN

Washington, July 28—(AP)—The senate today passed and sent to the White House a bill raising the pay of 150,000 government employees in the lower brackets.

Among other things, the bill fixes \$1,200 per year as the minimum for full-time adult employment, instead of \$1,020.
