

RECKLESS DRIVER WHO JUMPED BAIL IS GIVEN \$25 FINE

Gale I. Andrews of Coquille pleaded guilty yesterday to a charge of reckless driving, and was fined \$25 and costs in justice court. Andrews, while working at the cantonment last spring was involved in a head-on crash with an auto driven by Fred W. Hale of the Central Point area in which Hale and his wife were injured, and Andrews himself was in the hospital three weeks.

Near the end of his convalescence Andrews posted bail, and returned to Coquille. According to the district attorney, Andrews forfeited the bail. Sunday he was returned from the coast city.

State police, one of whom witnessed the accident, filed the charges. Andrews, according to the report on file, was ducking in and out of traffic, at high speed when the accident occurred.

Allen R. Hilkey, 15, of Central Point, charged with driving an auto without an operator's license, was fined \$1.50 and costs.

Clinton Moore and Henry T. Shankland, charged in a complaint signed by L. R. Rupp with the theft of two pieces of canvas valued at less than \$35 were fined \$25 and costs.

Astoria Tuna Price Skyrockets to \$408

Astoria, Ore., July 28.—(AP)—Albacore tuna prices skyrocketed to \$408 a ton today on 9,000 pounds sold by Capt. Sigurd Aldrickson of the schooner Salten.

Today's figure was \$20 higher than the former record, set last week.

The Salten's delivery—worth \$1,838 to the skipper and crew—was the second largest of the season here.
