

HARVEST OF GRAIN IS HANDICAPPED BY DEARTH OF LABOR

County Agent Says Some of First Hay Cut Still in Fields—Grain Yield Normal.

Harvesting of the Rogue River valley grain crop is now in full swing, somewhat handicapped by the lack of farm labor, County Agent Robert G. Fowler reported today.

Otto Bohner of the Central Point district is so short-handed he has to spend his evenings looking for help, and Ernest Niedermeyer of the Jacksonville area is operating a threshing machine with only the aid of a small boy, the county agent said. They gather up three wagon-loads, run it through the machine and repeat this process all day.

The county agent also said some of the first hay cutting of a month ago was still in the fields, with the second crop growing up around it.

The oat, wheat, and barley crop will be a normal yield, and better than expected in some sections, and less in others.

SOUTHERN OREGON VETS FORM UNIT OF PURPLE HEART

A southern Oregon chapter of the Order of the Purple Heart was organized at a meeting of United States war veterans held Tuesday night in the armory. The chapter will be the second in the state, the first being in Portland.

Floyd K. Dover was appointed temporary chairman and Francis H. Walker, temporary adjutant. Permanent officers will be elected at a second meeting in the armory the evening of August 11.

The order was originally organized by General George Washington at the close of the American revolutionary war, according to Mr. Walker. For a considerable period the group was inactive following the death of the founders, but following the first World War it was revived by a group of veterans. Only men who have suffered wounds during one of the nation's wars are eligible. It is thought about 18 men in the valley will be eligible for the local chapter.

The local order will carry on work in the interest of war veterans and will be open to wounded veterans of the present war, Mr. Walker states.

INDIAN BOY KILLS PAL WHEN ANGRY

Sacramento, July 30.—(P)—A 14-year-old Indian boy, Donald Geary, was held for murder today in the shooting of his hunting companion, Wilbur Barless, 13, on an Indian reservation near Alameda.

U. S. Attorney Emmet Seawell ordered a first degree murder charge filed against the boy. District Attorney Charles Lederer of Modoc county said young Geary had confessed he shot Barless, also an Indian, at close range in a fit of rage.

Salem, July 30.—(P)—The state department of agriculture warned today that use of saccharin in foods as a substitute for sugar is illegal. The department said it has learned that some food manufacturers in Oregon are using it to replace some or all the sugar required in foods.

WPB MAN COMING TO GIVE ADVICE TO BUSINESSMEN

Edward L. Kropp of the War Production board will be at the Jackson county Chamber of

Commerce all day Friday to help local business men with their production requirements plan form PD25A, and to answer other questions concerning priorities.

Under the plan form PD25A, all manufacturers must return their form to Washington, D. C., by August 10 with estimates of the amount of critical metals they will need during the last quarter of 1942, and no metals will be allocated unless the form is properly returned before that date, it was explained.

In a letter to the chamber of commerce, J. Fred Bergesch of Portland, district manager of the Office of War Information, War Production board, stated: "Return of the forms by August 10 will mean that for the first time WPB will be able to process the individual applications with full knowledge of the overall supplies and requirements picture. In addition, the elimination of form PD275 and simplification of form PD-25A will make it easier for the manufacturer to meet the deadline."
