

MEAT SHORTAGES CLAIMED DUE TO PRICE CEILINGS

National Livestock Advisory
Council Says Producers
Unable to Fatten Stock.

Omaha, Neb., July 30.—(AP)—That the rising tide of meat shortages in many cities may become nationwide due to curtailed cattle feeding was stressed in a brief of information prepared by the National Livestock Advisory Council and presented to the Office of Price Administration in Washington today.

The brief, a digest of testimony from cattle men of 18 states, taken at Des Moines July 15-16, was made public today by officers of the council, consisting of leading livestock producers and feeders from the corn belt and cattle producing states. Possible meat rationing by December 1 is seen unless action is taken, according to Council President Jay Colburn of Harlan, Ia.

Ceilings Blamed

Asserting that the nation's beef tonnage is threatened by present price ceilings, the brief emphasized that cattle are being marketed at lighter weights, causing losses of 100 pounds or more per animal.

The council's statement to the OPA concludes that meat rationing is unnecessary if farmers are permitted to feed meat animals to normal market weight. The brief maintains that this is impossible under present price ceilings and presents a four-point program for stabilizing feeding costs.

Cherry Slugs Easy To Kill by Spray

Many cherry trees are showing the effects of cherry slugs. These slugs feed on the upper surface of the leaves. The leaves then turn brown and appear partly skeletonized. The slugs vary in size according to age so may be found from very small up to one-half inch in length. As the slugs are heavy feeders and consume much of the upper leaf surface they are easily controlled by spraying with lead arsenate.

Any form of dust will also give control. Hydrated lime or sulfur gives quick results. Home owners with a few small trees could get fair control by throwing fine road dust or other fine dust onto the leaves.

Pear Spray For Controlling Drop

Hormone sprays developed in recent years have proved very effective in preventing the pre-harvest drop of pears. A number of growers intend using this material to lengthen the picking season without excessive loss from dropped fruit.

In the use of this material it should be remembered that it is effective only for a period of from 15 to 20 days. The warmer the weather the shorter the effective period. As dropping becomes worse as a general rule, as the season advances, this spray should not be applied more than 18 days before the block will be harvested.

One of the greatest sources of loss is during picking. The use of inexperienced help will increase this loss. The use of the drop preventing hormone will in 15 or 18 days of the completion of harvest will greatly reduce this loss. Frozen Corn Is Palatable Dish

There has been much controversy as to whether freezing corn is the most satisfactory method of preservation, and even more as to the methods to use. As for the first problem, we won't attempt to answer it, but certainly it may be said that frozen corn if properly prepared for the locker and table makes a most palatable vegetable.

One of the great objections to frozen corn is that it tastes of the cob. This is unnecessary if the corn has been properly blanched. Blanching stops the action of the enzymes and the vegetable retains its original color and flavor. It is necessary, however, to blanch corn on the cob for a longer period in order to stop the enzymatic action in the cob as well as in the kernels.

Corn may be packed either dry or in a two per cent brine on the cob or cut. The brine is made by dissolving one level teaspoon plain salt in one cup of water and pouring over the vegetable. If brine pack is used one to one and a half inches must be left at the top of the container for expansion. Avoid using iodized salt for freezing.

Following are the directions for preparing corn for freezing: Corn-Cut: Select corn when kernels are full, rounded, highly colored with rich, milky, sweet juice. Harvest early in the morning. Husk, silk and cut. Scald corn before cutting to prevent loss of kernel content. Scald or blanch for at least two to three minutes in boiling water (212°F.). Pack in a two per cent brine or dry pack in glass, enameled tin cans, waxed locker cardboard cartons with waxed paper liners or in waxed paper cups.

Corn on the Cob: Select corn the same as for cut corn. Husk, silk and trim off rough ends. Scald or blanch for eight to 10 minutes in boiling water (212°F.). Cool promptly and drain. Dry pack only in large enamel cans or wrap ears tightly in double-waxed paper twice.
