Billy Hulen Says:

Series Between Craters, Dorris Has Many Angles

This upcoming two-game series between the Craters and Red Talbot's Dorris, (Cal.) Lumberjacks here Saturday night and Sunday afternoon has so many interesting angles that excitement is almost certain to flare up all over the place when the two clubs start their Oregon-California league argument.

Foremost of the events to transpire, of course, is "Joe Dickinson Day" Sunday, when Major General Charles H. Gerhardt, commander of the 91st Infantry Division, presents to the big Crater hurler a gift from the Medford Athletic association, with Joe later to receive a "purse" contributed by fans who appreciate what he has done for the Craters since joining the team a little over a month ago.

Then, there is that situation revolving around Jim Snyder, the Craters' new lefthanded pitcher. Snyder, who had been with Dorris all season, was released by the Lumberjacks last Saturday, was immediately signed by the Craters and, in his first start for the locals, came up with a four-hit, 11 to 0 blanketing of the Grants Pass Merchants.

Although Snyder undoubtedly doesn't feel too bitter toward the "Jacks," being as how he was sort of kicked upstairs from a third-place club to one leading the league, he can be expected to bend every effort in an attempt to show Manager Talbot what a mistake that portly gentleman made in cutting him loose. Snyder will probably pitch the series opener on Saturday night.

Then, there is the acute embarrassment suffered by Dorris the last time they took on the Craters. The "Jacks," in that series, dropped both games to our boys. That wouldn't have been so bad had it not been for the fact that one Crater pitcher, and only one, pitched both those games.

The pitcher, of course, was Pvt. Joe Dickinson. He whipped 'em in the first game, going the full nine innings, and he whipped 'em in the second, flinging eight frames. This doesn't set well with the lads from California and when Joe strides on his mound Sunday afternoon on his own "day," the visitors will have blood in their collective eyes. They'll ruin "Joe Dickinson Day" for Joe Dickinson if humanly possible.

All in all it should be a whale of a series. The Craters, with a full two-game lead over the Klamath Falls Pelicans with only six to play, can't afford to drop one or both of their Dorris contests at this stage of the flag chase. For, while Medford and Dorris are meeting, the Pelicans will be entertaining the weak-sister, cellarite Grants Pass Merchants, and are almost certain to nab both clashes.

Assuming that Klamath walls off Grants Pass twice, Medford must win two against the "Jacks" in order to maintain its margin of leadership. If the Craters split, their lead will be reduced to one game, and, if they should suffer a double setback at the hands of Dorris while Klamath is coping a pair, the race will be all tied up.

In closing, may we remind Mr. and Mrs. John Q. Phan that a box will be placed at the entrance to the grandstand Sunday to receive cash contributions for Private Joe, or personal gifts for the soldier chap who has won five games and lost one and is batting .481 for our league-leading Craters.

White Sox Sweep Doubleheader From Champion Yankees

New York's Lead Shaved to 12 Games as Tribe Beats Boston—Cards Lose.

The Chicago White Sox have been going nowhere in the American league ever since the season started, but they have attained one distinction denied every other club in the circuit. They are the only team to sweep a doubleheader from the world champion New York Yankees and they have accomplished the feat not once, but twice.

When the Sox first turned the trick in New York on June 28, the Yanks were in a slump and the Sox didn't get much credit. It was like picking on a man while he was down.

But they caught the champions last night at the crest of a winning streak that included four straight victories and 15 of their last 16 games and proceeded to whip the Yankees at the kind of ball for which New York is noted—slugging.

The first game was played at twilight and the Yanks gave Atley Donald a 5-1 lead with five runs in the third inning, two of them on Joe DiMaggio's 16th homer. Then the Sox slugged back to win 6-5 in 11 innings with old Sam West driving in four of Chicago's runs. He doubled for two to tie the score in the ninth and singled home the deciding tally in the 11th.

The second game, played under the lights, saw the Sox take an early 5-2 lead, the Yanks tie the score in the sixth, and then Chicago come back with two runs in its half of the same frame to win 7-5.

This merely denied the Yanks' big first place margin to 12 games, because the Boston Red Sox were nosed out 7-6 in 11 innings at Cleveland when Roy Weatherly singled with the bases loaded. Eight pitchers and five catchers were used during the struggle.

The other American league contests were equally wild. At St. Louis the Washington Senators squeezed past the Browns again 11-10 with four runs in the ninth inning.

The Detroit Tigers walloped the Philadelphia Athletics 12-7 in an affair that would have been considerably lopsided except for five Detroit errors.

"Bums" Up Lead
In the National league the Brooklyn Dodgers enlarged their lead to eight games by beating the St. Louis Cardinals 4-3 in a twilight tussle that was halted in the last of the seventh by wartime dimout regulations in the New York area.

The two doubleheaders which completed the senior circuit card were halved. The Chicago Cubs welcomed Van Lingle Mungo into the majors a bit rudely, beating the New York Giants 4-2 even though held to seven hits in the first game.

The Giants took the second game, however, 3-1 with Dick Bartell and Babe Young hitting homers and Bill Lohrman driving in a run with a single in addition to pitching nine-hit ball.

The Pittsburgh Pirates took their first game at Boston 3-0 on five-hit hurling by Truett (Rip) Sewell after being shut out for seven stanzas by Al Javery. Then the Braves retaliated with a 6-5 decision in the nightcap in behalf of big Jim Tobin.

CITY PLAYGROUND NOW SUPERVISED SIX DAYS WEEKLY

At the request of Major General Gerhardt, the city playground has been supervised by volunteer leaders six days each week. Changing from three days to six days necessitated enlisting many volunteer leaders, those in charge announced today.

Mrs. A. S. V. Carpenter, Jackson county recreation chairman, working with the Works Project administration staff has carried on this community project since early in May, the announcement stated, continuing:

"Because hundreds of army officers, wives and families were arriving daily, with the problem of securing living quarters facing them, the supervision of many new children in the community became a problem. The many requests for a nursery have not been met but this problem is being considered."

"Average attendance at the playground has been well over 70 children, all under the age of 12 years."

SID COHEN HURLS BEAVERS TO 2-1 WIN OVER SOLONS

Two Portland Singles In 11th Frame Score Winning Run—Angels Win, Lose.

It appears the San Francisco Seals made a good baseball deal in acquiring Al Lien, 26-year-old hurler, from Tacoma of the Western International league.

The lanky southpaw held the Los Angeles Angels, leaders of the Pacific Coast league, to three hits last night to shutout the Angels, 1 to 0, in a nightcap to a doubleheader.

San Francisco dropped the seven-inning opener, 4 to 6, as Sam Gibson, veteran chucker, was driven from the mound in the midst of a five-run assault in the third when Glenn Stewart cracked a two-run homer. San Diego and Seattle also

staged a two-game show with the Padres nipping a Rainier win-streak at 10 games by a 7 to 6 decision in the seven-inning opener, delayed more than an hour because Seattle's equipment was late arriving.

The Padres rallied to overcome a 6 to 2 Rainier lead in the first game, but Seattle recovered in the afterpiece to blank San Diego, 9 to 0 with a 15-hit attack.

Two In Row

For the second night running, the last-place Portland Beavers won from the second-spot Sacramento Solons. The team battled it out for 11 innings with a pair of singles bringing in a run for the Portland win, 2 to 1.

Sid Cohen yielded nine hits against 10 safeties allowed by Sacramento hurlers, Clarence Beers and Bill Schmidt, who was charged with the loss after he took over in the ninth with the score knotted at one-all.

Jack Salvesson, Oakland pitcher worked a three-hit performance to shutout Hollywood, 5 to 0, at Emeryville.
