

NORWEGIAN FLIERS VISIT MEDFORD IN TOUR OF COUNTRY

One Officer is Recent Escape
From Norway; Funds For
Training Planes Sought.

Lieut. Nils Olaf Melin of the royal Norwegian airforce and Sgt. Andreas (second name censored), also of the Norwegian airforce, were overnight visitors in Medford last night, breaking an air trip from San Francisco to Portland. The two young fliers are making a good-will tour under the auspices of "Wings for Norway, Inc."

Lieut. Melin, spokesman for the two, explained that his companion, who is piloting a Swedish training plane, had escaped from Norway but a year ago and that his last name is a military secret necessitating the use of but his first name.

Raise Funds

The purpose of the tour is to raise funds among Swedish-American people for training planes to be used at the training school in Toronto, Canada. Lieut. Melin explained that the tour has the permission of the state department and that a total of 35 cities will be visited. Medford was not on the official list of cities to be visited but the two, making the trip in the slow trainer, were taken with the appearance of the city from the air and decided to stop overnight. "We 'dived' on a couple of swimming pools we noticed from the air," Lieut. Melin said "and they looked so refreshing and the countryside was so beautiful we decided to come down."

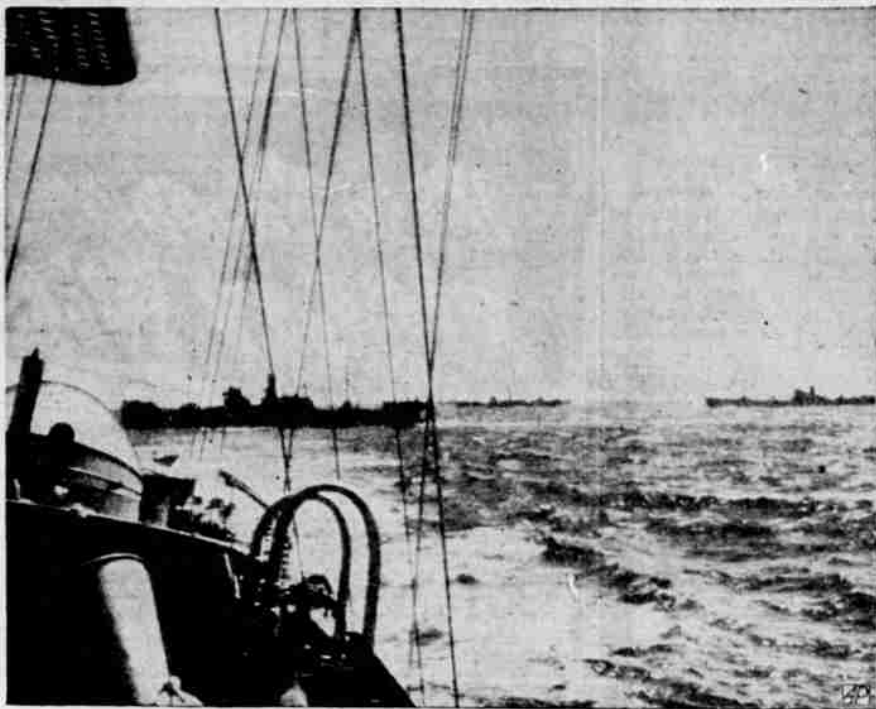
Lieut. Melin would say little concerning the war, merely remarking that "there is nothing pleasant to say." He said that the drive which they were conducting for funds had met with a wonderful response in all the cities visited. Lieut. Melin has been on this continent for almost seven years and the pilot but a few months. Sgt. Andreas is a native of Oslo and but 22 years of age. Both men were in uniform and made an exceedingly striking appearance.

Jacksonville Boy Who Survived Lexington Says Biggest Thrill Came in Watching Pilot O'Hare

Jacksonville, July 31.—(Spl.)—Richard Hall, son of Mrs. Grace Hall of Jacksonville, returned to a naval base this week to be assigned to a new U. S. navy ship. The only other ship on which he has served since his enlistment, January 17, 1941, was the aircraft carrier Lexington, which was sunk in the Coral sea approximately two months ago.

Born in Ashland the family later moved to the Applegate valley where Dick attended the Little Applegate and Sterling grade schools. Later he was graduated from Jacksonville high school and served as valedictorian of the class of '40. In September of the same year he enrolled at the Southern Oregon College of Education where he did honor work. In January he enlisted in the navy.

For four months after his enlistment he attended an electrical ordnance school in San Diego after which he was assigned to duty aboard the Lexington as an electrician's mate. Since joining the navy, Hall has had his first train ride, his first bus ride and his first boat ride. In his 80,000 miles of travel on the Lexington he was never seasick, even for a mo-

ment. When the fate of the Lexington was known Hall was in a motor room but was ordered to stand by on deck. However, when the vast store rooms of the ship were opened to the boys Dick with many others got a plentiful supply of ice cream. He said the only reason that he didn't fill his tin hat as was reported of so many of the others was that he didn't have a tin hat but he "managed to get at least a quart" before going over the side to a waiting lifeboat. Some of the Lexington's crew stayed in southern waters for additional duty but the most were brought home by transport.

On being asked what was his greatest thrill he said that it was seeing Lt. Edward O'Hare shoot down five Jap planes in a single combat on February 20, 1942, which won for O'Hare the Congressional Medal of Honor and a promotion to the rank of lieutenant.

Dick said that he enjoyed being home again but was anxious to get back to sea so that he could help "get another crack at those Japs."

Dick has three brothers, Harley, who is serving as a radio-

man in the navy; Eddie, who will be a senior at Jacksonville high school this year, and Lee, who will be a freshman at the same school.
