Announcement of the long awaited opening of the swank Service Command Unit Officers club at Camp White, Saturday, August 1, was made today by Headquarters, Camp White. Under the supervision of 1st Lieut. Edward P. Mallory, chairman of the house committee, the club will provide lounging and recreational facilities for the SCU officers who heretofore have had "no home of their own."

It is anticipated that the formal opening will be the first gala social event held by Service Command Unit Officers since activation of the camp.

Men Who Lead The 91st Division

Editor's Note: The Mail Tribune today begins publication of a series of brief sketches concerning officers of the 91st Division stationed at Camp White so that others at the camp and Southern Oregon citizens generally may be informed as to the background of the men who will lead the revived division.)

Colonel Russell C. Throckmorton, commander of the 361st Infantry Regiment and of the 361st combat team at Camp White, was born in LaBelle, Mo., February 12, 1892. He was graduated from Culver Military academy in 1911 and received his commission in the U. S. army April 6, 1917, after serving on the Mexican border in 1916.

He spent six months in France with the 35th division as commander of a machine gun company, and following his return to America after the war he attended the Infantry school at Ft. Benning, Ga., graduating in 1921.

In 1922 and 1923 Colonel Throckmorton served as assistant professor of military science and tactics at the University of Minnesota, and from 1923 to 1925 as professor of military science and tactics at the University of South Dakota.

From 1925 to 1929 the colonel was on command duty with the 35th Infantry in Hawaii, and upon his return to the United States was assistant P. M. S. and T. at Culver Military academy until 1935. He was graduated from the Command and General Staff school at Fort Leavenworth, Kan., in 1936, and from then until 1940 commanded the North Texas CCC district. From July 1940 to May 1942 he was on duty in Hawaii with the Hawaiian general staff as G-4, G-3 and G-1. He reported to Camp White July 13 of this year.

Colonel Throckmorton's principal hobby is golf, and he has expressed his pleasure at being stationed near such a fine course as that at the Rogue Valley Golf club.

Mrs. Throckmorton was born in Hawaii, her family having resided there since 1827, two years after the first missionaries arrived. Their son was graduated from West Point in 1935 and is now a major of infantry on the staff of Major General Bull in Alabama. Gen. Bull is head of the reception center and school command.

Russians pressed attacks (2) in Voronezh and Bryansk sectors, and claimed gains in Kalinin area (3). German leaflets threatened Leningrad with new siege.

RED CROSS OFFICE FOR CAMP WHITE

Headquarters, Camp White, today announced the establishment of a Red Cross field office. The office, headed by Field Director Joseph Laux of the Military Welfare, American Red Cross, is temporarily located in the northeast corner of the Quartermaster's division. The staff consists of Field Director Laux, assistant field director Donald Green, and Mrs. Dorothy Evans, who is in charge of the office.

Camp White men needing assistance may approach the office directly. Field Director Laux explained, stressing the fact that the motto of the Red Cross is "come in and talk it over," or they may carry their problems to the office through the Camp's Personnel division. The office will maintain a 24-hour schedule, said Field Director Laux.

HOPS STEADY

Portland, July 31—(AP)—Oregon hop markets continued to display a steady-to-firm tone during the past week as growers retained their remaining supplies, the Department of Agriculture announced today. Dealers continued to bid around the seasonal high, 52-53 cents per pound for regular seeded types and 60-62 cents for seedless qualities, net to growers, for 1942 hops.

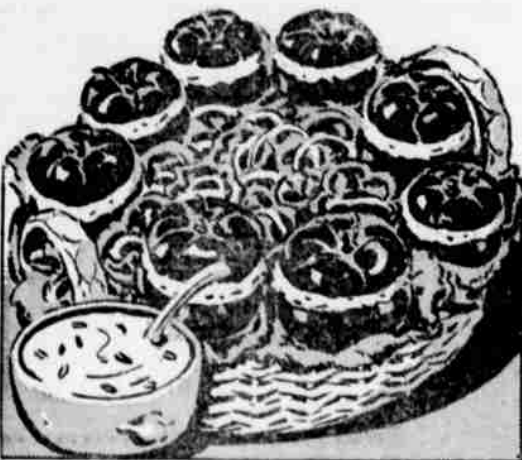
