

BOOK DONATIONS SOUGHT FOR MEN ON CARGO SHIPS

Captain Anita Morrill of the Red Cross Motor Corps has returned after an absence of three weeks. While on vacation in San Francisco, she was in contact with the Red Cross and the Motor Corps of that city, and gained much information for her own group.

Captain Morrill brings word that United Nations seamen on active duty in death-ridden oceans need reading material to ease a bit the strain of tense days and weeks they must spend out of sight of land, home and friends, with no diversion except the constant presence of danger to relieve the monotony.

Captain Morrill urges the public to bring to the desk of the Motor Corps at the office of the Red Cross in the court house, anything in the way of fiction, non-fiction, scrap books of jokes and picture magazines to be dispensed to ships going out to sea. Those unable to go to the Red Cross, may call Captain Morrill at 3794, or the Red Cross 4405, and a member of the corps will call for the books. To facilitate collections and conserve tires, donors are asked to collect books from their neighbors and friends so that several books may be picked up at once.

The regular meeting of the Motor Corps will be held Aug. 10 at 7:30 p. m. in the auditorium of the court house. J. A. Laux, the new Red Cross field director from San Francisco, will speak and important plans will be discussed with the group. The meeting is compulsory, and all members will appear in uniform by order of Captain Morrill.

FIRST AID TUTORS IN ASHLAND MEET

Thirty-two first aid instructors of the county, including a large number from Medford, met at the Elks temple in Ash-

land Wednesday evening. These meetings are monthly affairs with the instructors bringing up problems which arise in connection with the first aid classes.

Skewered Lamb 2 lbs. lean lamb 1 tsp. salt 2 lbs. beef, added oil 1/4 tsp. pepper 1/2 cup lemon juice 5 strips bacon 2 strips, grated onion

Cut meat into 1-inch cubes. Let stand about 4 hours in marinade of oil, lemon juice, onion, and seasonings. Drain. Place cubes on skewers alternately with 1-inch squares of bacon. Place in drip pan. Brown 15 minutes in very hot oven (350° F.), turning once. Reduce to moderate oven (300° F.); continue baking 30 minutes, or until tender, basting frequently. Serve on skewers. Makes 8 kabobs.
