

## RECREATION HALL TO BE OPENED IN OLD PHONE BLDG.

Structure on West Sixth  
Street Being Refurnished  
For Use of Men in Service.

Providing a recreation hall for men in the armed forces and offices for WPA personnel who will staff the facility, the old Pacific Telephone and Telegraph building on West Sixth street will be opened in the near future by the Jackson County Recreational Committee, Mrs. Alfred S. V. Carpenter, chairman, announced at the meeting of her board this week.

The building, Mrs. Carpenter explained, has been loaned to the committee for this purpose by the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company. She expressed the committee's deep appreciation to the company and to the officials who came to Medford to complete the plans. They were N. R. Powley of San Francisco, president; F. A. Dressler of Portland, vice-president; Jack Creager of the local office also assisted in completing arrangements.

**Union Men Help**  
Through cooperation of local labor unions and Frank J. Runtz, the building is being completely renovated and redecorated. Union plasterers and carpenters are busy converting the building into a recreation center and Runtz will do the tinting. The lower floor will serve as the recreation area, the upper floor as the offices for the WPA staff consisting of Mrs. Marjorie Pena, recreational technician, Miss Margaret Achterman, program director; Mrs. Florence Stacy, secretary and Forest Noble, area recreational technician working on the recreational program at Camp White.

Aiding the WPA staff in entertaining the soldiers will be a group of junior assistants, similar to junior hostesses of the USO. Chairman of the committee to obtain the junior assistants is Mrs. Glenn L. Jackson, assisted by Mrs. E. H. Janney, Mrs. E. C. Jerome and Mrs. Allen R. Smith. Senior leaders are Mrs. Norris Porter, Mrs. Clarence Drummond, Mrs. Glenn Gibbons and Mrs. Victor Sether. Girls over 18 wishing to volunteer as junior assistants are asked to get in touch with Mrs. Jackson.

**WPA Thanked**  
Mrs. Carpenter, stressing the necessity for recreational facilities when Camp White's soldier populace becomes complete several weeks hence, expressed gratitude to the WPA in providing the staff to operate the hall, at no cost to the city.

The building's decorations will carry the pine tree, insignia of the 91st Infantry Division at Camp White, and references will frequently be made to the eight western states, from which men of the 91st were drawn. Cities in these states have been contacted for pictures and other materials to be used in giving the building a home-like appearance, and efforts are being made to obtain home-town newspapers for the men.

Carlton, information; Eugene Thorndike, headquarters; B. E. Harder, finance; A. S. V. Carpenter and Frank J. Runtz, building and Miss Jane Snedcor, furnishings.

Mrs. Carpenter said that Miss Nina Duncan of Portland was scheduled to arrive here today to confer with the executive committee relative to starting a nursery school here for children of Camp White personnel and others. The school will be conducted through the community service division of the WPA and volunteer workers will supplement the WPA personnel.
