

"Joe Dickinson Day" Features Crater-Dorris Set This Week-End

PITCHER HONORED IN SUNDAY GAME OF LOOP SERIES

General Gerhardt to Participate in Ceremony—Snyder to Pitch Saturday.

The third-place Dorris, (Cal.) Lumberjacks roll into Medford this week-end to trade baseballs with the Craters in a two-game series featured by "Joe Dickinson Day" Sunday, and the season's largest crowds are expected to pack the fairgrounds park grandstand.

Saturday night's tilt will start at 9 o'clock sharp, that Sunday immediately after 2:30 p. m. ceremonies in which Major General Charles H. Gerhardt, commander of the 91st Infantry Division at Camp White, will present to Pvt. Dickinson a gift from the Medford Athletic association.

Jim Snyder, erstwhile Dorris left-hander now toiling for the Craters, will pitch against his former teammates in the nocturnal contest Saturday. Manager Dutch Lieber announced, with Dickinson, of course, going to the Crater mound in the Sunday struggle, shooting for his sixth Oregon-California league victory against one setback.

Carlstrom Hurls

It was expected that Manager Red Talbot of the Lumberjacks would counter with the veteran curve-ball artist, Clyde Carlstrom, in the Saturday night fracas, and come back with Big Bill Cecil, a right hander with a whistling hard one, for the "Joe Dickinson Day" party on the Sabbath.

The Craters, boasting a two-game bulge over the Klamath Falls Pelicans in the circuit flag chase, will be at full strength for the Dorris invasion. In batting order, here is the way the locals will line up: Jack Swarcyk, shortstop; Norm Worthley, catcher; Al Wray, centerfield; Manager Lieber, first base; Paul Hoffman, right field; John Gitten second base; Vic Waite, left field; Don Fawcett, third base and the pitcher.

The Lumberjacks are expected to take the field with the hard-hitting Bart Goldbar back of the plate, Jack Duracha on first, Marshall on second, Crisp on short, Earl Brooks on third, Oakes in left, Crenshaw in center and Snively in right.

Gift Bought

"Joe Dickinson Day" Sunday will be a gala affair, with the Medford Athletic association and fans showing their appreciation of what the big soldier right-hander has done. The association, team sponsor, has purchased Private Joe a handsome gift, which will be presented to him by Major General Gerhardt in a ceremony at home plate immediately after the stars and stripes are raised to the strains of the national anthem. The general will be introduced by a civic official.

Fans desiring to give Joe a personal gift are asked to place it in the box, which will be located at the entrance to the grandstand, and those wishing to contribute cash may also place the money in the box. The "purse" and gifts from fans will be given to Joe in the seventh inning.

Robinson Shoots for 122nd Win Against Angott Tonight

New York, July 31.—(AP)—The longest winning streak in modern fight history—Ray Robinson's run of 121 in a row—collides with Sammy Angott in Madison Square Garden tonight, and there's more than an outside chance that the collision won't do it a bit of good.

Although the skinny Harlem hammer is 1 to 2 in the betting to stay on the track that has left him all-victorious ever since he first drew on a glove as an amateur—especially since he already holds a decision over Angott—Sammy is a specialist at upsetting guys in return matches.

Sammy likes to fight from a half crouch, crowd his opponent close and then buff his opponent about the mid-section at short range—the shorter the better. Robinson, on the other hand, is a long, lean stringbean who wants to stand off a way and pitch his high hard ones.

In all his fights, he has shown little relish for the crowding kind of rival—and Sammy is one of the crowding-est.

Sammy's lightweight crown won't be on the line in this one—it is "stashed" away until he meets Allie Stolz again. Yet, promoter Mike Jacobs figures the fight presents enough of a nose-smashing party so that some 15,000 of the faithful, representing a gate of over \$30,000 will be sitting in on the shindig.

Robinson's long winning run has been piled up in 89 amateur and 32 professional outings.

"BUMS" MAY END CAMPAIGN ABOVE .700 PERCENTAGE

Present Pace Will Enable Club to Break 33-Year-Old National Loop Mark.

Fans probably don't pay a great deal of attention to the baseball standings these days because the New York Yankees and Brooklyn Dodgers are making runaways of the major league pennant races.

Some newspapers in the spirit of good clean fun and to promote interest in the standings of the clubs even have turned them upside down, putting the two Philadelphia clubs on top, or have separated the Yanks and Dodgers from the rest of their leagues.

Maybe it will be a surprise, therefore, to point out that the Dodgers have won 70 games and lost only 29 for a percentage of .707 and stand a good chance of becoming the first team in 33 years in the National league to finish above the .700 percentage level.

Cubs Crushed

The Dodgers added another scalp last night with a 9-2 conquest of the Chicago Cubs, who were crushed with a six-run rally in the fifth inning.

This increased Brooklyn's lead to 8½ games over the idle St. Louis Cardinals. The Yankees also were idle, but their American league margin was increased to 12½ games as the Boston Red Sox dropped a 4-3 decision to the Cleveland Indians.

The Washington Senators captured their third straight from the St. Louis Browns 11-6 and cooled off the Browns' second place hopes effectively.

Pinky Higgins drove in six runs as Detroit downed the Philadelphia Athletics 11-5 in the first game of a doubleheader but the A's slugged their way to a 7-6 triumph in the nightcap.

The Cincinnati Reds were held to four hits by Earl Naylor and Ike Pearson and lost a 4-2 verdict to the Philadelphia Phils in a night game.

WHIRLWAY SEEKS ANOTHER \$23,000

Chicago, July 31.—(AP)—Whirlaway, already turfdoms leading money winner with a \$454,336 bank roll, goes after another \$23,000 tomorrow in the \$25,000 added Lexington handicap, which will climax the most successful meeting in Arlington Park's history.

The race at a mile and a quarter, Whirlaway's best distance, may prove to be nothing more than a romp for the handicap champion. No eastern horse has dared to challenge him, and the opposition, such as it is, will come from horses that have been running at Arlington for the past 34 days.
