

Craters Keep Two-Game Lead by Whipping Lumberjacks, 15-12

LIEBER CATCHES, WORTHLEY HURLS IN WEIRD CLASH

Locals Come From Far Behind To Gain Victory—Swanson Batting Star.

Medford maintained its full two-game Oregon-California League leadership by whipping the Dorris (Cal.) Lumberjacks, 15 to 12, here yesterday in a fantastic exhibition that produced about everything in the book, including a Crater lineup-shift that put Manager Dutch Lieber back of the plate and Norm Worthley, regular catcher, on the pitching mound.

Meanwhile, the Klamath Falls Pelicans downed the Grants Pass Merchants twice in a doubleheader at Klamath Falls to stay two tilts back of the Craters, with only four to play.

Worthley was the third Medford flinger to see action, and he received credit for the victory. Jim Snyder, the former Dorris southpaw, lasted only two-plus innings against his former teammates, Lieber being forced to take over in the third inning with two on and none away. The boss, still unable to cut loose, staggered through the fifth, but in the sixth he went behind the plate and Worthley transferred to the mound to finish out the weird contest.

Uphill Fight
The Craters had to come from far behind to win and for a time it looked like they couldn't do it. The 'Jacks jumped into a 3 to 0 lead in the first 'rime, and after the locals got a pair in the second the visitors came back to score four more in the third for a 7 to 2 bulge. Snyder, in this inning, walked two, committed two wild pitches and balked once, at which point Lieber took up the flinging chores. A squeeze play tallied one runner, Lieber walked Shipman and Crenshaw's double scored Shipman before he retired the side.

Dorris got another run in the fifth to increase its lead to 8 to 2, but in the Crater half seven straight hits drove Bill Cecil to cover, created seven runs for a 9 to 8 Crater lead and forced Bart Goldbar to come to Cecil's rescue. Goldbar finished the game and was charged with the defeat.

Lead Changes
Worthley, strutting the sixth inning, was promptly rocked for four blows and three runs to put Dorris back in the lead, 11 to 9, but the Craters bounced back in their half for three and a 12 to 11 margin. A walk to Worthley, singles by Lieber, Waite and Swanson, an error and a balk accounted for the tallies.

Just to make certain of the victory, the locals punched three more across in the seventh to go ahead, 15 to 11. Snyder's single, Fawcett's sacrifice and singles by Wray, Lieber and Waite did the job. Dorris got its final run in the eighth.

Lieber got four blows, including a double, for the Craters, and Swanson hit a double and two singles to drive in four runs, including those that put the Craters ahead in the fifth and sixth innings. Goldbar hit two triples for the 'Jacks.

Clyde Carlstrom, who was scheduled to pitch for Dorris, was involved in an accident Saturday night, injuring his wrist, and Bill Cecil, who lost to the Craters Saturday night, 8 to 3, was forced to attempt an "iron man" stunt and pitch Sunday, also.

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DODGERS, GIANTS TANGLE TONIGHT IN RELIEF TILT

\$100,000 For Army Fund Expected—Mungo To Fling For New Yorkers.

The Brooklyn Dodgers, who might not be so far along with their work had they met the New York Giants more often, tangle with their hecklers from Harlem this evening in a contest that has generated more excitement in Gotham than any baseball battle since the last world series. Army relief will be the principal beneficiary.

With everybody who goes through the gates buying a ticket and many others purchasing ducats without going to the game, officials won't be satisfied with anything less than \$100,000.

The extra special attraction will be Van Lingle Mungo, new addition to the Giants' pitching staff, hurling against the Dodgers, whose uniform he wore when he was the terror of the majors not so many years ago.

A quirk in the schedule has kept the two teams apart since Memorial day. In 11 outings this season, the Dodgers won six and the Giants five. Whitlow Wyatt will be Brooklyn's starting pitcher for this evening's joust, which opens a four-game series. The Giants helped the Dodgers preserve their nine-game lead yesterday by slitting a doubleheader with the second-place St. Louis Cardinals, which is all the Dodgers could do with the Chicago Cubs.

"Bums" Split
It took the Dodgers ten innings to turn back the Cubs, 5-4, in the first game. In the second game, Claude Passeau pitched the Cubs to a 7-6 triumph. Carl Hubbell pitched the Giants to a 7-1 decision over the Cardinals. Then Mort Cooper tossed a four-hitter at the Giants and the Cards won, 3-2.

The Cincinnati Reds clung to their one-game third-place margin over the Giants by splitting with the Boston Braves. Al Jarvis blanked the Reds 7-0 on five hits in the first game, but Cincinnati took the second, 4-2.

The Pittsburgh Pirates dumped the Philadelphia Phils, 4-2, and 3-2, and hopped over the Cubs into fifth place.

In the American league, the New York Yankees downed the St. Louis Browns twice. A two-run homer by Tommy Henrich led the Yanks to a 4-2 victory over St. Louis in the opener and Ernie Bonham blanked the Browns, 10-0, in the nightcap, although he yielded ten hits.

The Indians nosed out the Philadelphia Athletics, 4-3 and 4-2.

The Detroit Tigers knocked the Boston Red Sox into third place by four percentage points, taking the first game, 8-4, as Paul (Dizzy) Trout pitched seven hit balls and contributed a three-run homer. The Tigers annexed the second, 6-2.

Washington's scheduled doubleheader at Chicago was postponed.

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Harbert and Harrison Duel Today in St. Paul Playoff

St. Paul, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Two of golf's "H" boys, Chick Harbert and Dutch Harrison, climb around the rugged Keller public links in an 18-hole playoff for the St. Paul open golf championship today and the \$1,000 that goes with first place. They finished all square Sunday with 280 strokes each—eight under par—at the end of the regulation 72 holes.

Probably more important to them than the coin is the title which will advance the fortunate winner farther up the ladder to fame.

Both, Harbert of Battle Creek, Mich., and Harrison, the Arkansas Traveler working out of Harrisburg, Pa., have been lauded by their compatriots as the up-and-coming golfers of the day—players whose names might someday rest beside those of Ben Hogan, Craig Wood, Byron Nelson and others in the fan-clan.

Therefore, an additional punch has been added to this playoff. Both boys are former Texas open champions, the 27-year-old Harbert winning it this year in a playoff with Hogan, and Harrison taking it in 1938. Both have figured in quite a bit of prize money during their comparatively short bids for places in golf's front ranks.

LOCAL CLASS IN SHIP JOINERY IS BEST IN OREGON

Assistant State Supervisor Says Medford Fortunate In Having Fine Instructor.

The best ship joinery classes of the entire state war production training set-up are being conducted in Medford according to Clem C. Clarke, Salem, assistant state supervisor of the war training. Mr. Clarke was in Medford Saturday to inspect the local classes.

Mr. Clarke states that Medford is unusually fortunate in having Richard Anderson of Rogue River to instruct the ship joinery classes. He pointed out that Mr. Anderson was trained in this work in his native Sweden. The local classes are out-ranking those being conducted in Portland, Clarke says.

Had Retired
Mr. Anderson has been a seaman, and during the last world war did ship joinery work in Los Angeles. He later was chief maintenance man for the Harold Lloyd estates near Hollywood and then retired to a home on the Rogue River. When the present war broke out Mr. Anderson, who is but 60, applied at the local employment office for any work at which he would be useful and was sent to E. H. Medrick, in charge of war production training for Medford.

Mr. Medrick states that at present Mr. Anderson has two classes with about 30 men in training. The classes are conducted three nights a week in three-hour sessions and placement in shipyards is absolutely sure when the classes are completed Mr. Medrick and Mr. Clarke pointed out that only men of some carpentering experience should apply for the classes since Mr. Anderson cannot spend time training in basic carpenter work.

Thousands of men are needed.

ed for ship joinery work, Mr. Clarke stated and he urged anyone interested to see Mr. Medrick at his office in the city hall. Welding classes are also being conducted and in a short time there will be vacancies available in these. These workers are also assured of ready work, Mr. Clarke said, and he pointed out that wages in both types of work are excellent.

The joinery and welding classes are conducted at the shops of the senior high school on South Oakdale avenue.

FEW CRAWFORDS READY IN WEEK
