

PLANE SPOTTERS PICNIC CONCLAVE SET FOR AUG. 16

Eugene Gathering For Pleasure And Instruction Expected To Attract 5,000.

Eugene, Aug. 3.—(Spl.)—An "army" of aircraft spotters is to meet in Eugene on August 16, for a picnic and conference, for the pleasure and instruction of some 5000 or more ground observers and filter center workers.

Ranking army officers of the IV fighter command from San Francisco and Portland are expected. The ranking officer of this group is Brigadier General W. E. Kepner, commanding the IV Fighter Command.

Announcements and invitations have gone to national and state notables, including Governor Charles Sprague, Secretary of State Earl Snell, the governors of California and Washington, county defense chairmen, county coordinators, mayors and others.

The program opens with registration at 10 a. m. for spotters and filter center workers and families of both. At 11 a. m. a war service is to be held in the city park. The public is invited to attend this open air service, with the churches of Eugene and outlying districts cooperating. It is expected that the attendance at the war service will be around seven thousand.

Picnic Dinner
A picnic dinner will follow the war service, the observers, filter center workers and families will all eat in the lilacs will bring their own picnic park.

Recreation, including band concerts and other music will follow the picnic dinner and will continue until 2:30 when the general assembly is called in the Armory. Here the serious work of the conference begins and both the observers and filter center workers will receive instructions from the army personnel in attendance. Members of the families not included in the actual instruction will be entertained by the movies which will probably include the attack on Pearl Harbor and the Bombing of the Marshall Islands. A special meeting of chief observers and key filter center workers will close the conference.

THREE CARS AND GRAVEL TRUCK IN MAIN STREET MIX

NAVY UNIVERSITY UNIT DEDICATED

Bayview, Idaho, Aug. 3.—(AP)—The first of six units being built here for training of navy men was ready to receive up to 5,000 trainees today after dedicatory exercises held here yesterday before a crowd of 25,000 persons.

Called the Farragut Naval Training station, the vast new "university of naval warfare" will be second only in size to the Great Lakes Naval Training center and, when finished, will train 150,000 sailors a year.

Dedicated yesterday was unit "C" which is but one-sixth of the project, all of which is scheduled to be finished some time in November. At that time more than 600 buildings will have been built and \$48,000,000 spent.

NEGRO SOLDIERS NOW ENJOY OWN RECREATION HALL

A recreation hall for negro troops was opened Saturday in Medford through cooperation of Jackson County Defense Recreation committee, the local Chamber of Commerce and the USO. Representatives of these organizations worked Saturday to set up tables, chairs, a music box, writing and reading material, games and other material for the first play-hour that night. It is announced that more equipment is needed for the recreation hall.

The USO has asked that the names of business firms, particularly those serving food, open to negro troops be listed with the USO center. Officers of the organization state that the negroes are being embarrassed by the refusal of some local establishments to serve them and

point out that a list to which the negro service men might refer would prevent this embarrassment.

Chorus for the negro men will meet Wednesday evening at 7:30 at the Christian church under direction of Mrs. Esther Leake Jensen.

Two new dance orchestras for service men are being formed under the direction of the USO. A cowboy band, with Major Johns as director, is being organized and tryouts will be held Thursday at 7:30 o'clock at 229 N. Bartlett street. A dance orchestra, with Capt. Ernest Jilick as director, will also have tryouts Thursday night.

Townpeople enjoying group singing or Little Theatre activities are invited to attend these meetings. A mixed chorus of junior hostesses and soldiers meets under direction of Mrs. Jensen each Monday night at 229 N. Bartlett street and the Little Theatre group meets every Friday at the same time and place.
