Warren and Hobson, among other things, will discuss the outlook for sports during wartime.

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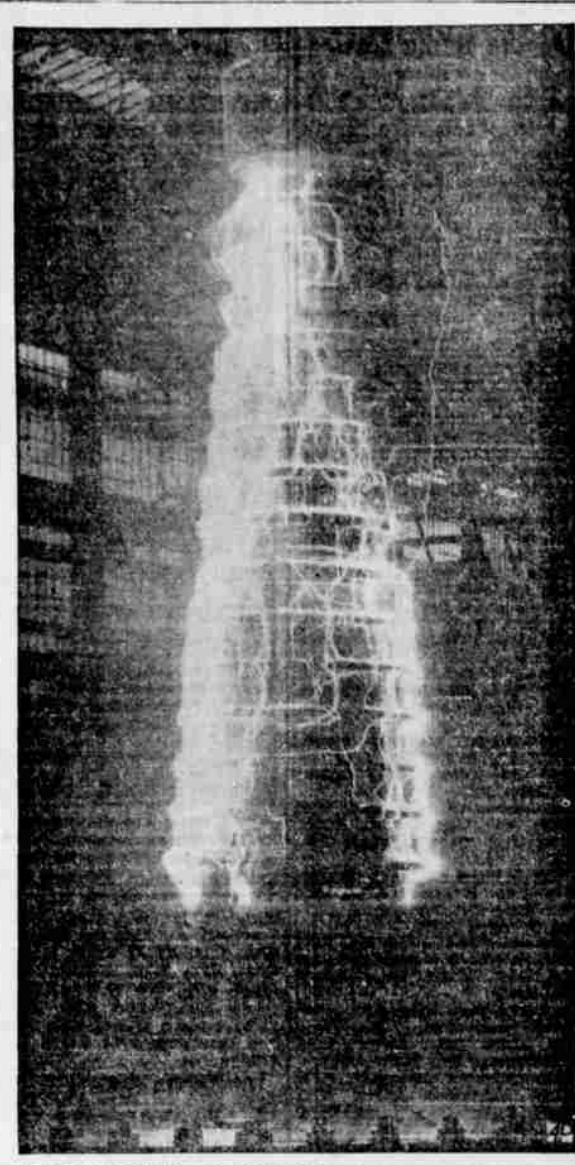
