

GANDHI PROPOSES DECLARATION FOR DEAL WITH JAPS

All-India Congress Party Asked to Favor Statement in Draft Resolution.

New Delhi, Aug. 5.—(P)—The British government for India reported today that Mohandas K. Gandhi had proposed to his All-India congress party this declaration:

"If India were free, her first step would be to negotiate with Japan."

Gandhi himself, in Bombay, acknowledged use of such language but suggested it was for bargaining purposes and said he wanted to help China.

The statement on negotiating with Japan was contained in Gandhi's draft of a resolution calling for a civil disobedience campaign by the All-India congress party.

Submitted April 27, this draft was rejected after a more moderate nationalist leader, Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru, vigorously opposed it. A resolution couched in different terms now is being considered by the party's working committee.

Gandhi's draft, as released today by the government, was quoted as saying:

"Japan's quarrel is not with India. She is warring against the British Empire. India's participation in the war has not been worth the consent of the Indian people. It was a purely British act. If India were freed, her first step would probably be to negotiate with Japan."

State Enjoys Record Year On Liquor Fees

Salem, Aug. 5.—(P)—The State Liquor Control commission reported today it had its biggest year in history during the year ended June 30, its total liquor sales being \$13,924,844 compared with \$10,399,657 during the year ended June 30, 1941.

Most of the gain was made in the state stores located in cities, rural agencies showing no increase.

The commission's profit for the year was \$5,143,174, compared with \$3,902,842 in the preceding fiscal year.

Sales of liquor permits were up from \$110,408 to \$138,280.

About 176,000 tons of iron and steel were collected in the United Kingdom during the first seven weeks of a salvage campaign.

Bulkeley Decorated for Daring Exploits in Philippine Seas

Washington, Aug. 5.—(P)—President Roosevelt personally bestowed the Congressional Medal of Honor today on a young navy lieutenant commander, Jo'n D. Bulkeley, for his daring exploits as commander of a motor torpedo boat squadron for four months in Philippine waters.

It was Bulkeley and the men of his mosquito boat squadron who eluded the Japanese and evacuated Gen. Douglas MacArthur and President Manuel Quezon of the Philippines from beleaguered Corregidor island. But the citation accompanying the award of the nation's highest military honor did not even mention this.

Bulkeley won the medal, instead, for operations "believed to be without precedent" in damaging or destroying "a notable number of Japanese enemy

planes, surface combatant and merchant ships and in dispersing landing parties and land based enemy forces during the four months and eight days of operation without benefit of repairs, overhaul or maintenance facilities."

Melbourne, Aug. 5.—(P)—Eight persons were killed in the collision of two RAAF training planes which fell into the Murray river in south Australia, air minister Arthur Drakeford disclosed today.

Ban Iron and Steel in Mattress Making After September 1

Washington, Aug. 5.—(P)—The war production board today prohibited use of iron and steel in mattresses after September 1, and in studio couches, sofa beds and lounges after November 1. Simultaneously, WPB fixed strict quotas on production of bed spring frames.

The order will stop production of innerspring mattresses entirely and force bed spring makers to use wood or some other substitute in spring frames.

Under the new restrictions, processing of iron and steel for use in mattresses, pads or pillows is halted immediately. During the rest of this month, manufacturers may use an amount of iron and steel equal to his average monthly consumption of the metal during the year ended June 30, 1941—provided it is already processed or fabricated.

Stocks of buttons, ventilators, handles and eyelets may be used until exhausted, but further production of these accessories is prohibited.

Chronic Debtor Not Wanted As Citizen

Seattle, Aug. 5.—(P)—Federal Judge Lloyd L. Black today denied citizenship to Ernest Penninsula, native of England, when informed that the father of 11, although employed in a \$230-monthly war industry job has failed to repay any of the \$4,000 he received in relief funds during the depression.

The court also criticized the applicant for failing to repay any of the \$600 worth of medical attention King county had supplied his family; for failing to pay private creditors and for failing to purchase war bonds or stamps.

Portland, Aug. 5.—(P)—Portland butchers have accused wholesalers of improperly marking meat up in grade during the current shortage. Richard G. Montgomery, Oregon OPA director, said today. He called wholesalers to a meeting Friday.

PHYSICAL FITNESS PLAN OUTLINED AS PHASE IN DEFENSE

F.S.A. Consultant Speaks to Representatives of County Groups at Court House.

An outline of the program for physical fitness which the Federal Security administration is promoting for the nation was given yesterday afternoon by George Holstrom, Washington, D. C., physical fitness consultant for the security administration, who spoke at a meeting in the courthouse auditorium attended by representatives of various city and county health groups, schools, churches and other groups.

Mr. Holstrom opened his discussion by stating that the physical fitness program should not be confused with mere "settling-up exercises" and explained that it was a long-term effort to bring every person in America up to his full standard of health in order that the nation as a whole would be able to cope with the strain of war.

In Three Phases
The program is being set up in three phases according to Mr. Holstrom, including a pre-drafting program for prospective service men, a program for industrial workers and an over-all program for the general civilian population. It also includes a recreation set-up which tends to take care of the "soldier impact" in districts where large numbers of troops are quartered. Recreation, nutrition, hygiene will all be considered in the program he said.

"We can be a healthy and a victorious nation if we will all do our part in the war effort," Mr. Holstrom declared, and he pointed out that one thing which every person could do was to bring his own physical fitness up to a high level.

Discussion Follows
Discussion and questions followed Mr. Holstrom's talk and several ideas as to the local program were offered. Two ideas offered from the audience were that the program must not be one that required considerable time, since time is at a premium for almost everyone during the war, and that it should not be "sugar-coated" but rather made to appear as something absolutely vital in the war effort and therefore necessary.

Mr. Holstrom was accompanied to Medford by Donald Orpitt of Portland, field representative of the Federal Security agency, who joined in the discussion.
