

FEE HINTS EARLY HEARING OF CASES IN CONDEMNATION

May Call Jury and Try Actions on Camp Land This Summer or Early Fall.

Judge James Alger Fee indicated in federal court here this morning that condemnation trials involving land in the Camp White area would probably be held prior to the regular October term of federal court, declaring he "might call the jury and try the cases this summer or early fall."

The current session, which convened yesterday afternoon upon the arrival in Medford of Judge Fee and his daughter, Lillian, is a continuation of the 1941 term, and is being held to prepare the cases for trial and set their dates. A recess until this afternoon was declared after a short morning session.

Attorneys for October
Attorney George Roberts, representing the Jackson County Land company and Attorney Otto Frohnmayer of Neff and Frohnmayer, counsel for the Judge F. L. TouVelle property, told Judge Fee they preferred October trials for their clients due to having other cases on their schedules in September.

Bernard H. Ramsey, special attorney for the department of justice, who will handle the condemnation cases for the government, told the judge that his office in Portland would be swamped with October trial cases involving Camp Adair land and other defense property purchases, and that it was rather unprepared to handle cases in Portland and Medford simultaneously.

Judge Fee said that, while he did not want to work a hardship on local attorneys representing Camp White landowners, he would try to get the trials in before October.

Kelly Ready
Attorney Edward C. Kelly, representing some 20 landowners, told the judge that he had no preference as to the time of trials involving lands of his clients.

Attorney Roberts told the court that the Jackson County Land company, representing the largest single acreage in the condemnation proceedings, had not yet been served with a summons and petition for condemnation, and the judge replied he would see to it that such action was expedited.

Although at least 200 cases are involved in the condemnation proceedings, it was expected that some of them would be settled without going to trial, Ramsey said, and added that many of them were on the schedule simply to clear title and not because of any dissatisfaction on the part of land owners on the government's appraisal prices.

23 MISSING AFTER U-BOAT ATTACKS

Twenty-three men were reported missing today from the sinkings of two merchant ships—British and United States—in submarine attacks at extreme ends of the submarine battlefield in the North Atlantic.

Ninety-five men, however, were rescued from the two vessels which brought the Associated Press total of announced sinkings in these waters since December 7 to 413.

The U. S. cargo vessel, torpedoed early in July 200 miles off the New England coast, went down with the loss of 19 men.

Survivors of the British ship in an east coast port said three torpedoed struck their vessel July 21, killing four men when they were within 10 miles of a Caribbean port.

FIFTH SPRAY DUE SOON FOR MOTHS

The fifth cover spray for control of codling moth should be completed before harvest which should start about August 17, according to L. G. Gentner, entomologist, Southern Oregon Experiment station, and C. B. Cordy, assistant county agent, in the following announcement.

"As there is no particular peak hatch expected before this time, this spray may be worked in at convenience with the last irrigation. It may be applied first and the spray put on just before picking. This spray is necessary in order to protect the fruit during harvest as a rather heavy attack is anticipated in late August and early September."

"Use quarter pound Colloid 77, three pounds of arsenate of lead and one quart of stove oil per 100 gallons. Add in order listed in quick succession to partly filled tank with agitator running. With astringent lead, use quarter pound of Multifilm instead of Colloid 77."
