

MEDICAL OFFICERS ASSIGNED TO DUTY IN 91ST DIVISION

Large Group of First Lieutenants Due From Carlisle Field Service School.

A large group of July 31 graduates of the Medical Field Service school at Carlisle Barracks, Carlisle, Pa., all first lieutenants in the U. S. army medical corps, have been assigned to the 91st division at Camp White, according to a news release from the school quoting Brigadier General Addison D. Davis, commandant of the Medical Field Service school and assistant surgeon general of the United States army.

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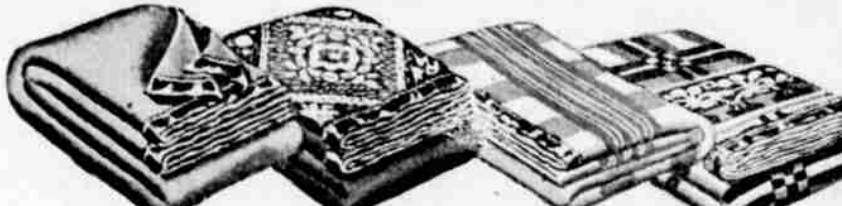
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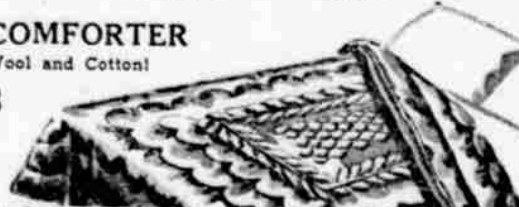
