

Pitchers Blank Opposition in Five of Seven Major League Games

SLUGGERS HALTED BY SPECTACULAR WORK OF HURLERS

Dodgers, Cards, Giants, Red Sox and White Sox Score Shutout Victories.

Pitching always is the main spring of baseball, but yesterday it was almost the whole works in the major leagues.

In the greatest one-day concentration of pitching prowess this season, five of the seven games played ended in shutouts and not a single home run was produced in the entire card. In fact, there was only one triple.

Rookie Max Macon, pitching his first complete game since joining the Brooklyn Dodgers several weeks ago, muffed the New York Giants to two hits in winning 4-0 and for the first five frames had a no-hitter.

John Beasley of the St. Louis Cardinals and Cecil (Tex.) Hughes of the Boston Red Sox each hurled three-hitters, the former trimming the Cincinnati Reds, 5-0, and the latter stopping the Philadelphia Athletics, 7-0.

Steals Home

But Hal Newhouser pitched five-hit ball and lost in the rarest game of all as Don Kolloway stole home to give the Chicago White Sox a 1-0 decision over the Detroit Tigers.

The only other American league game was the one contest that developed into a batting melee, Cleveland curbing the St. Louis Browns 8-5 in a night tilt with a six-run rally in the fourth inning.

All the other National league activity also was at night. In one of the best National league games Truett (Rip) Sewell blanked the Chicago Cubs, 3-0.

Although he didn't get a shutout Tommy Hughes pitched five-hit ball at Philadelphia lead the Phils to their second straight victory over the Boston Braves, 5-2, with the help of Danny Litwhiler, who hit a triple and double good for three runs.

BARRETT FORGES STRIKEOUT LEAD

Los Angeles, Aug. 6.—(AP)—The Pacific Coast baseball league may be electrically dilled by army orders, but that doesn't prevent a pitcher's duel to dim-out batters from throwing off sparks.

One strikeout behind a week ago, Seattle's veteran Kewpie Dick Barrett has nudged into the lead over Blix Donnelly, Sacramento's sparkling young right hander, in pitchers' statistics released today and including Tuesday's games.

Barrett is credited with 128 strikeouts, to 125 for Donnelly. A week ago the Solons' hurler led, 118 to 117.

San Diego's fastballer Frank Dasso is close behind with 120 while Ken Raffenberg, Los Angeles curve expert, has 116.

BEVOS DROP PAIR TO RAINIERS TO APPROACH RECORD

The Portland Beavers are on the verge of breaking a record—but it's an even bet they'll do everything possible when they meet Seattle again tonight to prevent themselves from doing so.

Last night the Beavers lost two more games to the Seattle Rainiers by identical 5 to 2 scores and ran the losing streak of the Beavers to nine games—one less than the Pacific Coast baseball league cellar occupant's record for the season.

Dewey Soriano yielded the Beavers three hits in the seven-inning opener when his teammates established a five-run lead by scoring twice in the first and adding three tallies in the third when Joe Orrell was driven from the hill.

The Beavers threatened late in the second game when Ted Norbert homered with one on to put the Beavers within a run of the Rainiers, but Hurler Larry Guay retired the side.

The Rainiers came back in the ninth to score twice.

The San Diego Padres followed up Tuesday night's 20-hit batting spree by collecting 14 safeties and downing Sacramento, 8-3.

Los Angeles, the loop pacesetter, defeated Oakland, 7-2, to halt the Oak win-streak at nine games.

The Angels pounded Italo Chellini's mound offerings for 12 hits including a homer by Will Schuster. Jess Flores limited the Oaks to six safeties.

At San Francisco, the Seals scored two runs in the eighth inning to nose out Hollywood, 4-3.

DUCK GRID COACH SEES MEDFORD AS MATERIAL SOURCE

John Warren and Howard Hobson Speak at Lions Lunch—Outlook Bright.

John A. Warren, head football coach of the University of Oregon, in an address delivered to Medford Lions at their regular weekly luncheon-meeting at the Medford Hotel yesterday, held high hopes for a football team that would maintain a commanding position in conference circles this fall.

"Even though some valuable players have joined our armed forces, we expect to be situated favorably with regard to our opponents, who also have contributed considerably to our common cause. Medford is an important community and we are looking to it to supply other outstanding football material, such as Bob Smith and Bernie Hughes," he stated.

Howard Hobson, University of Oregon basketball and baseball coach and a former coach at the Southern Oregon College of Education, spoke on other phases of university athletics, stating that promising material for officers would be encouraged to enter the university and to enroll in one of the training programs outlined by the war board, including the navy, R. O. T. C. or the air force.

It was planned, he said, to permit many of these to complete their studies. He said that emphasis would be placed on physical training that would develop outstanding physique—a departure from the training of the past, in which one-third of college men inducted were rejected because of physical defects.

STOLZ CHOICE TO OUTFIGHT WRIGHT

New York, Aug. 6.—(P)—Silly as it sounds, Newark's Allie Stolz takes on Featherweight Champion Chalky Wright of Los Angeles in Madison Square Garden tonight with the lightweight title as his goal.

Wright's championship, recognized by the New York State Athletic commission but not by the National Boxing association, will not be at stake. But a victory for Stolz virtually would assure him a shot at the 135-pound crown, worn by Sammy Angott.

Stolz has met Angott once and lost to him by a decision so close that the Newark battler figures the title will be his the next time he can qualify for a bout with the champ.

In spite of the California's 15 years' experience in the ring, or possibly because of that, Stolz is rated the favorite at odds of 5 to 9.

EUGENE DEFEATED BY RED SOX, 8-3

Silverton, Aug. 6.—(P)—Roy Helser hurled a four-hit 3-3 State league victory for the erstwhile cellar-dwelling Silverton Red Sox over the league-leading Eugene Athletics here last night. The defeat narrowed Eugene's lead over the Portland firemen to a single game.

Of the four hits allowed by Helser, only one was a clean blow and all of Eugene's three runs were unearned.

The Red Sox broke a 3-3 deadlock in the eighth inning when Bill Taitt, who collected three hits during the evening, blasted out a two-run triple to send Bud Brewer to the showers.

Portland, Aug. 6.—(P)—A drawing held by the State Game commission leaves 1,925 prospective hunters of cow elk and doe deer without licenses.

The commission had 2,000 elk licenses and 2,415 applicants, 3,000 deer permits and 4,510 applicants, so the drawing was held yesterday to eliminate the over-subscription. Fees paid by those eliminated will be returned.
