COMMANDO PLAN USED BY JAPS IN PAPUAN LANDING

General Blamey Says Supply Main Allied Problem—Defense Failure Explained.

London, Aug. 6—(P)—The Japanese are renewing their spoken threats against Australia, according to a Tokyo broadcast recorded today by Reuters.

"If she (Australia) does not sever her political relations with Great Britain and America it will be necessary for Japan to intervene with her armed forces," a Colonel Yahagi, spokesman for the military section of imperial headquarters, was quoted.

General MacArthur's Headquarters, Australia, Aug. 6—(P)—Japanese troops using the same commando methods which spearheaded campaigns in Malaya and the Philippines made the recent landing in the Buna-Gona area on the Papuan peninsula of New Guinea, Gen. Sir Thomas Blamey, commander of allied land forces in the southwest Pacific, said today.

The main problem confronting the allies in New Guinea is one of supply, Sir Thomas asserted. He pointed out that allied routes across the towering Owen Stanley range from Port Moresby to Kokoda, where port skirmishing has been in progress, was more difficult than the Japanese route from Buna-Gona.

Failure Explained
An allied military spokesman said the new Japanese foothold in New Guinea offered no special threat. Answering criticism of the allies' failure to prevent this landing, he said it was impossible to defend the Buna-Gona area "without sacrificing troops involved."

After inspecting an advanced Australian base, Blamey said his troops looked extraordinarily fit and would "be a tough proposition for anyone taking them on."

M'NARY RELAYS HOUSING PLEDGE
Washington, Aug. 6—(P)—Senator McNary (R., Ore.) said in a statement today that the maritime commission had agreed to construct 6,000 additional

apartment units in Portland to house shipyard workers and if more were needed when the last 2,000 of the apartments were 80 per cent completed to construct them.

The senator said the commission desired to stabilize employment in the Oregon Shipbuilding corporation plants at approximately 80,000 employees as of next January 1.

NURSERY SCHOOL PLANNED AS PART OF WAR EFFORT

Plans are under way for development of a nursery school in Medford for children of working mothers, national defense workers, and service men. The project will be sponsored jointly by a local council and the WPA. The Official Board of the First Christian church at Ninth and Oakdale agreed last night to permit the school to use its building and equipment.

Mrs. Nina A. W. Duncan, WPA state superintendent of nursery schools, has approved the preliminary plans and agreed to send two teachers from Portland and to assist on the salaries of two other workers from Medford if they can be secured under the WPA standards.

The local council will have to furnish the food for the noon meal, light lunches morning and afternoon, beds for the children to rest, playground equipment, toys, dishes, and the specialized equipment for such a school. It will also be necessary to provide the salary for one full-time worker to serve as principal. The budget for the school has not been completed.

Children two, three and four years of age will be eligible for enrollment. A few five-year-olds may be accepted. An attempt is being made to have the school ready to open on Monday morning, August 17. Priority will be given children of mothers who are either in defense work or the fruit. A nominal tuition will be charged to help defray expenses.

Those who are interested in enrolling children in the school may make their application to the Jackson County Civilian Defense Committee on Recreation, telephone 2907, room 225 in Medical Center building.

Members of AFL Bakers' union local 24 voted last night to return to work immediately and submit their differences with their employers to Arthur C. Miller, local official of the social board, who will serve as arbitrator.

Bern, Switzerland, Aug. 6—(P)—Leading Catholic clergymen in France, with the support of the Pope, have made a serious appeal to the Vichy government in an effort to alleviate the condition of the Jews and curtail an anti-Semitic program. It was reported today, but indications in reliable foreign quarters were that deportations to the east, at least of foreign Jews, would continue.
