M'LEAN ARRIVES FOR U. S. COURT

Leo McLean, United States deputy marshal from Portland, arrived in Medford today to assist Paul Hanlin, U. S. deputy marshal here in serving summons and petitions for condemnation to former land-owners of Camp White. The pair will be busy for several days.

A short session of federal court this morning was recessed until 10 a. m. Saturday, after Judge James Alger Fee granted orders authorizing the payment of 80 per cent of the appraisal prices to three more former Camp White land-owners who have vacated their property.

SURPRISED JAPS LOOK FOR MORE YANKEE PLANES

Chungking, Aug. 7 — (P) — With 34 planes in all, the Japanese extensively reconnoitered Hunan, Kwangtung and Kwangsi provinces today, according to the Chinese Central News agency, as a sequel to yesterday's destructive American air attack on one of their airdromes.

United States army bombers attacked the airdrome near Canton yesterday, destroying at least 10 grounded enemy planes, Lieut. Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell's headquarters announced.

"The Japanese were taken completely by surprise," a headquarters communique said. Besides the destruction of grounded Japanese planes, the bombers scored hits on the airdrome runway, it said.

All of the American planes, including bombers and fighter escort, returned safely to their bases.

OFFER PERMITS TO BURN GRASS

The city fire department is now granting permission to citizens to burn dry grass on vacant lots they own, and those wishing to eliminate these fire hazards are asked to contact the department and provide it with information relative to equipment available for the burning and location of the lot.

The city is at present burning the grass of many city-owned lots. Ed Canoose, assistant fire chief, explained that the fire department was not burning grass this summer, but was standing ready at all times in case any help was needed to extinguish grass fires that might get out of control.

HUMAN FLY WILL CLIMB SATURDAY

In the interests of Medford's war bond sale campaign, Billy O'Brien of Pittsburgh, Pa., the "Human Fly," will climb the face of the Medford branch of the First National bank Saturday night at 7:30, according to W. A. (Bill) Gates, county chairman of the bond sale committee. O'Brien, who has been employed at Camp White the past several weeks, will also hang by his feet from the top of the building and extricate himself from a straight-jacket. O'Brien is donating his services to the committee in the hopes of selling a large number of war bonds.
