

EQUIPMENT GOING "DOWN UNDER" IS TERMED TRICKLE

Supplies From U. S. Could be
Replaced in Three Days
Production, is Word.

General MacArthur's headquarters, Australia, Aug. 7.—(AP)—United States equipment sent to Australia is a "trickle" which could be replaced by three days of America's war production, according to an authoritative source who cannot be specifically identified. He was unable, he said, to disclose the exact figures because of military secrecy, but he declared Australia was carrying her own load and any view that great sacrifices were being made in war areas elsewhere for Australia's defense were unwarranted. Other areas are not being stripped of war goods for her benefit, he said.

The Australian and American public has been somewhat confused because of necessary secrecy, he continued, but he said he could disclose that the greatest part of the defense forces of Australia are Australian. The incident to this defense from abroad would scarcely compensate for

Australian troops that are in war theaters, he added.

Few Planes
Although in the air a much greater relative percentage of strength in the Southwest Pacific is American, it is "insignificant" when compared with American potentialities, he added.

As to United States ships, he said, these would little more than balance the losses of services of Australian ships abroad. Norman Stockton, the Melbourne Herald's war correspondent, asserted today that the time had come for some very plain speaking on the subject of military aid to Australia.

"We do not want another Malaya, another Java, yet I say all the potentialities are here," he declared. "Our capacity to defend Australia depends upon the aid we receive from the United States."

"For the time being, at least, MacArthur, the most offensive-minded of all allied generals, has been placed in the position where apparently he cannot take the offensive."

"The United States has considered that this country, in the wider strategy of global war, must play a secondary role for the balance of 1942—perhaps longer."

STAGGERING SUM IN WAR ACCOUNT SHOWN CONGRESS

\$205,514,657,286 Author-
ized Between June 1,
1940 and June 30, 1943.

Washington, Aug. 7.—(AP)—A compilation of congress' fiscal activity showed today that the staggering sum of \$205,514,657,286 had been appropriated or authorized between June 1, 1940 to June 30, 1943 for expenditure to provide the nation's defense and war needs.

The figures, including a breakdown of both war-necessitated and "normal" appropriations voted this year, were prepared by the bureau of the budget and were placed in the congressional record by Senator Glass (D-Va.) and Rep. Cannon (D-Mo), chairmen of the house and senate appropriations committees.

Mostly For War
Of the \$139,770,114,641 appropriated during this session, Cannon pointed out that approximately \$133,370,000,000 was earmarked for war purposes while approximately \$6,400,000,000 was tagged for ordinary costs of government.

Glass, in his analysis of the figures, declared that congress had reduced appropriations for the normal activities of government by \$1,667,005,150.89 below last year's figures, and made increases in that category of \$579,872,154, leaving a net cut of \$1,087,132,996.71.

Made In Advance
In citing the three-year \$205,514,657,286 total on the books for war expenditures, Cannon emphasized that the figure did not represent actual expenditures.

"Appropriations and authorizations," he said, "need to be made far in advance in order that programs of orders for material, weapons, naval vessels, merchant ships and all other war-effort requirements may be integrated with the recruitment and training of manpower, and the long range planning and conduct of the war in the various theatres of action where that way may be fought."

PRE-FLIGHT CLASS IS PLANNED HERE IN COMING TERM

Preparations are being made by city school authorities for offering a course in pre-flight training to local high school seniors the coming school term according to E. H. Hedrick, city school superintendent. The courses are to be taught by Miss Mary Jean Barnes, Phoenix.

The pre-flight courses are being offered at the request of the federal government, Mr. Hedrick states, and will be for senior boys and girls who have had sufficient mathematics and science instruction as a prerequisite. It is expected that a large number of students will avail themselves of the opportunity for this special training.

Miss Barnes, a graduate of the Southern Oregon College of Education at Ashland has a pilot's license and a ground instructor's certificate. She has recently been teaching classes in meteorology and navigation for the air patrol and civilian defense work in the county and last year was a laboratory assistant at the Ashland college.

Mr. Hedrick stated today that greater stress would be laid on mathematics and science classes in high school this coming term since this training is needed as a background for so many war industries and for the service. He pointed out that the Medford high school has always stressed these subjects, due to the fact that an unusually large percentage of graduates enter Annapolis, West Point, Harvard, Yale and other institutions requiring

these courses, but that even greater stress would be given them for the next few years.

BELIEVE FIREBUG PLYING TRADE IN UPSTATE SECTION

Cottage Grove, Ore., Aug. 7.—(AP)—State police and FBI agents searched today for an incendiary, believed to have set a fire which last night virtually destroyed the big J. H. Chambers and Son sawmill here and two other blazes in this area within the past two weeks.

Chief of State Police Charles Pray said he thought a "dangerous pyromaniac" was on the loose.

He classed the three fires as a single case on which every man of the state police investigation department was working. FBI agents went into action immediately.

Chambers estimated the fire damage at his mill at \$300,000. It was one of the three largest mills in Lane county with a daily capacity of 150,000 board feet. The fire swept the mill, dry kiln, planing mill and 5,000,000 feet of lumber, he said.

Previously the \$75,000 home of Walter Woodard, Cottage Grove lumberman, was burned. A few days later his mill had a \$40,000 fire.

Police Chief Myron Perry of Cottage Grove also reported evidence pointing to arson in the Chambers mill blaze.

91ST BUYS \$4,076 WORTH OF BONDS

Men of the 91st Infantry Division at Camp White are not only training to fight the Axis with bullets and mechanized equipment when the time comes, they are right now doing their part with dollars, plenty of them.

Following their first pay days August 1 and 3, officers and enlisted men of the 91st purchased \$4,076 worth of war bonds and

stamps, according to the 91st division war bond officer. And, this sum does not include the sizeable amount deducted from their pay checks under the voluntary allotment system, the officer said.

Erb Says Freedom Must Be Purchased In Many Payments

Klamath Falls, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Freedom must be bought on the installment plan with a never-ending series of payments, Dr. Donald M. Erb, president of the University of Oregon, told members of the Oregon association of real estate boards at their convention banquet last night.

"Our history is teeming with wars," he declared. "Our history shows that we are a violent people. Our nation was born of revolution. We have had our bloody civil war, we have had lynchings, vigilante governments, the Ku Klux Klan, violent and bloody strikes, our haymarket riots."

"In not one of our wars have we been prepared for war. . . . We have never been willing to keep up on our installment payments for freedom."

Damaged Troopship Is Landed On Belly

Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 7.—(AP)—After circling the Buffalo airport for more than eight hours while its crew struggled to make emergency repairs to a damaged gear, a Curtiss commando transport plane (C-46) landed last night without injury to its seven occupants and with only minor damage to the "troopship of the air."

The commando, built by the Curtiss-Wright corporation airplane division to transport soldiers, jeeps and light artillery, had nearly exhausted its fuel supply when Curtiss test pilot Herbert Fisher brought it in for a "belly" landing.
