

DIVISION UNITS PLAN DISPLAYS AT OPEN HOUSE

Artillery, Engineers, Infantry, Service Units Each to Demonstrate August 15.

Every unit of the 91st Infantry Division—infantry, artillery, engineers, and the service units—will be represented by numerous displays and demonstrations at the big "open house" program, marking the division's activation, at Camp White, Saturday, August 15.

Demonstrations in physical training and principles of combat, as taught to today's American soldier, have been prepared by the division's three infantry regiments—361st, 362nd, and 363rd. These phases of the program will include mass calisthenics, Ju-jitsu, disarming tactics, anti-tank defense, wall-scaling and precision drills.

The 91st division artillery—346th, 347, 348th, and 916th battalions—will show their "shooting irons", instruments, and other equipment used to bring masses of fire down on the enemy. Cannoners will demonstrate the functions of a gun crew.

To Exhibit Weapons

The service elements—316th Medical Battalion, 416th Quartermaster Battalion, and 91st Signal Company—will exhibit their weapons and equipment. Arms and equipment of the division's two other units, the 91st Reconnaissance Troop and 316th Engineer Battalion, will be displayed.

A first aid station will be operated by the 316th Medical Battalion.

Provisions for conveniences are being prepared for the huge crowd expected. Traffic control, markings, guides, rest stations, and parking areas are being arranged and established by the 91st Division Provost Marshal. Visitors will find no effort has been spared by the "Wild West Division" to make the occasion an impressive and enjoyable one.

MAGNESIUM PLANT INTERIOR BURNS

San Francisco, Aug. 7.—(AP)—The interior of a three story building of the Pacific Coast Chemical and Processing company magnesium plant at Aberdeen, Wash., was destroyed by fire late yesterday but the flames were checked before reaching any magnesium powder, the San Francisco ordinance district announced.

The firm's general manager, W. L. Saunders, said production would not be stopped more than a few days. Army officials attempted to determine cause of the fire.

WAGE HIKE GRANTED

Washington, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Three Marshfield lumbering companies were under War Labor board order today to grant a wage increase of 7½ cents an hour to their 740 employees. Companies affected are Coos Bay Logging, Coos Bay Lumber and Port Orford Cedar. The award is retroactive to last April 1.

FIRST BARTLETTS EXPECTED AUG. 17; PLANTS PREPARE

Packing plants of the valley are making preparations for the opening of the pear season. First picking of Bartletts is scheduled to start Monday August 17, but will not be in full swing before the end of that week. The usual test runs for packing house machinery will be made at the start. For some time, packing plants have been making machinery repairs and replacements, and making boxes.

There is no change in the canner pear situation with the price at \$75 per ton for No. 1 grades. Deals have been reported at slightly lower and slightly higher figures. Fruitmen admit at \$75 per ton good returns will be received. The more optimistic talk of an \$80 per ton price.

The Bartlett pear crop is coming along in fine shape, under present weather conditions. The crop is estimated at approximately the same as last year, with a slightly lower quality in some areas.

The labor situation is the dark cloud on the horizon, with many valley workers now engaged in war projects and industries at high wages. Young boys and girls are now employed in many orchards and with the harvesting many will be used as pickers, and as sorters in plants. There is not expected to be as much migratory labor as in previous years. Some fruitmen hold the crop will be harvested, but later than normal.
