OFFICERS OF 91ST HOSTS TO RIDERS FOR TOUR, PICNIC

Officers of the 91st Infantry Division at Camp White were hosts yesterday at a picnic-ride, weapon-demonstration and informal pistol match to 82 members of the Jackson County Sheriff's Posse, Ashland Trail Riders and members of the Medford and Clear Lake Oregon State Guard cavalry.

Assembling at Dixie Mound on the Camp White reservation at 10 a. m., the riders were conducted on a tour of the division area, during which they witnessed demonstrations by the 361st Infantry battalion on the obstacle and bayonet courses.

The ride ended on Rogue River, where a demonstration of infantry weapons was held and a trick riding show by members of the 91st cavalry team was staged.

In the informal pistol match, the sheriff's posse carried off the honors by a close margin over the 91st division officers, followed by the Ashland Trail Riders and the Oregon State Guardsmen.

Major General Charles H. Gerhardt, commander of the 91st Infantry Division, and Dr. C. W. Lemery of the sheriff's posse, each made scores of 50 out of 50.

Lunch was served army style and was cooked on the field range at the grounds.

UPTON SINCLAIR IN PLEA TO M. K. GANDHI

Pasadena, Calif., Aug. 10.—(P)—Author Upton Sinclair said yesterday he had sent a cable to Mohandas K. Gandhi, India's Nationalist leader, "prayerfully urging your support for efforts to overcome Axis reactionism."

"After the victory, a cooperative democratic federation will be obtainable. Otherwise our hopes perish," Sinclair said in his message.

FUNDS FOR RELIEF OF SERVICE MEN STILL COMING IN

While the drive for funds is continuing throughout the fall in the eastern states, here many relief benefit events are being held, the local committee urges that the few remaining Jackson county solicitors who have been delayed in completing their canvassing endeavor to do so this week. Funds should be left with Dwight Houghton, committee treasurer for Jackson county, at the United States National bank.

Approximately 20 solicitors have yet to be heard from, and completion of their work will save the committee in charge of the drive, time, rubber and gasoline, it was pointed out. The drive has been very successful and the final report will be made public as soon as the last solicitor can be checked on.

The committee today expressed appreciation of the public spirited way in which the solicitors undertook to make the drive successful and thanked the public for its patriotic response.

FIFTH COLUMNIST WORK IS ERASED

Mitchell Field, N. Y., Aug. 10.—Ground markers emblazoned by rural fifth columnists with plows and other farm implements to guide enemy bombers to vital objectives have been discovered by army air observers and destroyed.

Danger to large eastern airports and plane factories to which the markers pointed thus

has been averted, Col. Dache M. Reeves, commanding the 1st ground air support unit of the 1st air force, said in making the disclosure yesterday.

"Proper action" was taken by army intelligence officers and the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Colonel Dache said, without announcing the fate of those who fashioned the ingenious markers visible only from the air.

Portland, Aug. 10.—(P)—Funeral services were held here today for Simon Benson, pioneer northwest lumber and hotel man, who died Wednesday in Los Angeles. Governor Sprague headed the list of honorary pallbearers.

PLAN EXPERIMENT IN NAZI PROCESS FOR MAKING GAS

Pittsburgh Research With Coal Authorized by Senate Appropriation Measure.

Pittsburgh (U.P.)—A new method of making gasoline from coal will be experimented with here by a federal chemist in an \$85,000 experimental plant to be erected at the United States Bureau of Mines.

The Senate appropriations committee has authorized construction of the plant in Pittsburgh for the collection of data on the production of gasoline from coal. In it, Dr. Henry H. Storch, principal physical chemist for the mines bureau, will direct his research into new channels.

Recognized as the pioneer in synthetic gasoline research in this country, Dr. Storch already is producing gasoline from coal by the Bergius "high pressure" method developed in Germany.

Butene Is By-Product
Now, the chemist will attempt to develop the other German-discovered method known as the Fischer-Tropsch process. This process has as a by-product butene, an important ingredient of butadiene, the raw material used for synthetic rubber.

Six years ago, Dr. Storch began producing gasoline by the Bergius process. He is now producing 50 pounds of gasoline—about seven gallons—a day by this method from 100 pounds of bituminous coal, in a small coal hydrogenation plant at the bureau of mines here.

The government wants him to fathom the secrets of the other German process now, hence the grant for the new plant. Both methods of hydrogenation were developed in Germany and both have been closely guarded secrets of the Nazis.

Won't Help Present Shortage
Dr. Storch holds little hope that manufacture of gasoline

from coal can be sufficiently developed in time to ease the present east coast fuel shortage. But he is looking to the time—in the distant future—when crude oil scarcities arise and some substitute must be employed for the natural product.

He believes that a simplification of the coal-into-gasoline process can be used in some of the big refineries of the eastern seaboard. He explained that while most of the refineries are not built to withstand the high pressures needed for the process, they can adapt themselves to the relatively low pressures used in the "mild hydrogenation" fuel oil.

AIR PRIORITY OFFICE
Washington, Aug. 10.—(P)—Included in seven regional air priorities control offices being established by the air transport command to expedite air shipments will be one at Seattle for the district embracing Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana.

IRRIGATION PEAK OVER THIS WEEK

Peak of the irrigation season will be reached this week with the last soaking of pear orchards before the Bartlett picking starts next week. The Medford irrigation district from present conditions will close the season "in fair condition, and better than expected," according to Ed N. Judd, manager. The Talent district has a good supply of water left, he reported. If no rains come, a pinch may be felt in September, Judd stated, but the need of much water will be over by that time.

The June rains saved the day, according to Judd. Otherwise, the valley would now present a "scorched earth" appearance. Harvesting of the grain crop is proceeding well despite a labor shortage. Most of the potato crop has been dug, also some of the early onions. Both are minor crops.
