

FRANCIS BECOMES SUPERINTENDENT AT WING'S DAIRY

Jackson County 4-H Club Agent Resigns to Take Guernsey Farm Helm.

L. E. (Bing) Francis, for the past three and one half years Jackson County 4-H Club agent, has tendered his resignation to the Oregon State college extension service to accept the position of superintendent of production at Wing's Cloverhill Registered Guernsey Farm, it was revealed today.

Mr. Francis, a graduate of Oregon State college, has been active in extension work for nine years during which time he has served in Folk, Washington and Jackson counties. While assistant county agent in Washington county he was active in Guernsey promotion and assisted in organization of a Guernsey association there. While in Washington county he had the

state champion dairy production demonstration team which represented Oregon at the 1938 National Dairy Show. His activities in connection with the Guernsey breed in Jackson county have resulted in the county having one of the strongest 4-H Guernsey programs in the state with the only registered Guernsey calf club in Oregon.

Mr. Francis is president of the Medford Kiwanis club. He has also been active in Oregon State Guard and other local activities. Cloverhill Registered Guernsey farm has been building a herd for the past 12 years and now has 105 registered Guernseys, one of the leading herds in the state.

The dairy is producing grade A whole milk and marketing under supervision of Golden Guernsey Inc. At the last inspection the dairy was given a 100% score, the highest score given by Golden Guernsey in Oregon, Washington, Utah and Idaho.

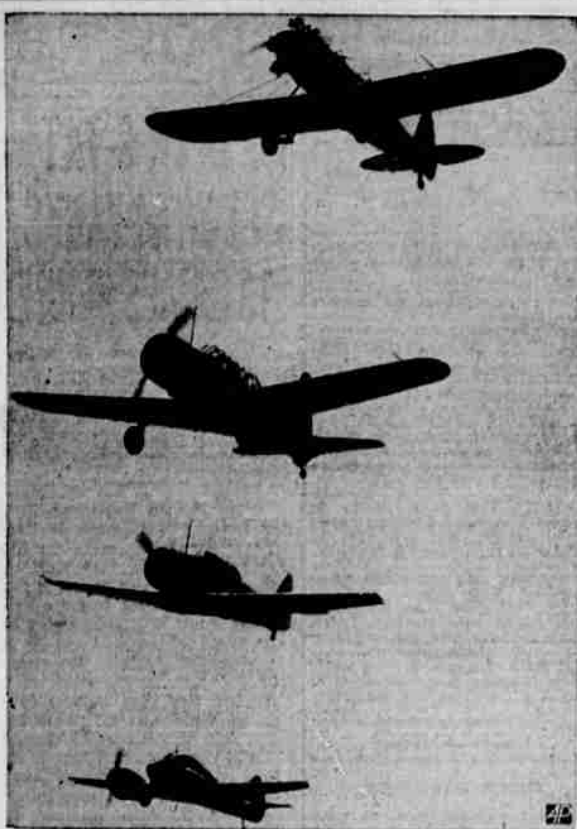
Commenting upon his new position today, Mr. Francis said "ever since I weighed milk as a boy of 12, for the Oregon State college dairy I have had the desire to someday become associated with an outstanding purebred enterprise. Guernsey cattle have always been a strong favorite of mine and I feel it both a compliment and a privilege to be given an opportunity to become associated with Cloverhill."

Charles A. Wing of Cloverhill in an interview stated that he was very happy to have one so well qualified in charge of Cloverhill's herd and its production.

KLAMATH COUNCIL LOWERS BOOM ON TAXI "LEGGERS"

Klamath Falls, Aug. 11.—(P)—City councilmen last night proved they meant what they said when they recently warned drastic measures would be taken to stop the taxicab bootlegging business here.

The council revoked the license of a taxicab driven by George Young when he violated the state liquor law. Young's conviction in justice court was called to the council's attention and the revocation followed over protests of George Duke, for whom Young had been working as a taxicab driver.

Duke declared he had discharged Young as soon as he found out Young had sold liquor unlawfully.

Mayor John Houston said the city is pledged to help the State Liquor commission stamp out taxicab bootlegging.

SENATOR EXPECTS ALEUTIAN VICTORY
