

Graduate Managers Recommend Squad Limit for Grid Elevens

PLAN WOULD TRIM PLAYING ROSTERS TO 28 PER GAME

No Limits on Scouting Asked—Plans Worked Out For Air Raid Situations.

San Francisco, Aug. 12.—(P)—Pacific Coast conference universities, if they follow the advice of their graduate managers, will limit their 1942 football playing squads to 28 in any one game, unless the contests are between schools less than 50 miles apart.

The managers, meeting here yesterday, reached the proposed limit of 28 through a survey held by each of the 10 member universities.

It showed that while some of the larger schools sometimes carried as many as 45 players in their travels, the average to play in a game was between 25 and 30.

In other moves designed to meet war time conditions, the managers recommended to faculty athletic representatives that no limits be placed on football scouting, that a uniform date for the opening of freshman football practice next year be set, and that each school play one game in which the net proceeds would go to the army and navy relief fund.

In addition, the managers worked out plans for meeting situations that would arise if an air raid alarm occurred during a game period.

Half Score Final
They recommended that the score should be regarded as final if the game had gone two full quarters or more at the time of the alarm, and that spectators not be given rebates if the game was 50 per cent completed when play was suspended.

Last year's conference plan, of permitting up to 3,000 service men free admission to all football games, except the California-Stanford game, was recommended for 1942.

U.C.L.A. obtained an open date on Oct. 3 to play the St. Mary's naval aviation west pre-flight school when it was voted to combine a pair of Los Angeles contests into a double-header. These were the U.C.L.A. vs. Idaho and the U.S.C. vs. Montana games. The double-header will be played Dec. 5 in Los Angeles.

A committee to work out a uniform athletic award program in all of the conference schools was appointed.

FAMOUS SHOOTER TO EXHIBIT HERE FRIDAY EVENING

Highlighting the program of entertainment of the United Service Organizations this week will be the presentation at the Jackson county fairgrounds ball park at 8:30 Friday evening of the nationally famous marksman, Herbert Parsons, with an exhibition of sensational shooting of all kinds of small firearms. The event is also sponsored by the Medford Rifle club and Medford Gun club.

CHRYSLER PAYS 75 CT. DIVIDEND

New York, Aug. 12.—(P)—The Chrysler Corp., huge former auto manufacturers now turning out tanks and other war materials, today declared a dividend of 75 cents a common share compared with a dividend of \$1 a share paid June 13 and \$1.50 September 13, 1941.

The dividend was made payable September 14 to stockholders of record August 22.

Earnings of the company for the six months ended June 30 were equal to \$2.02 a common share, less than half the \$4.82 a common share reported for the comparable 1941 period.

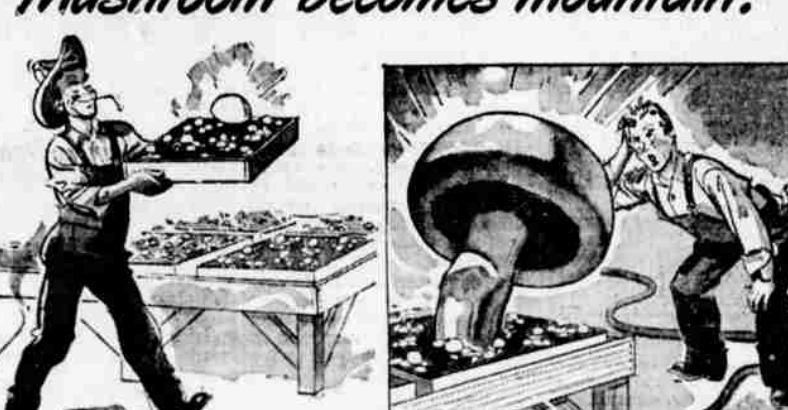

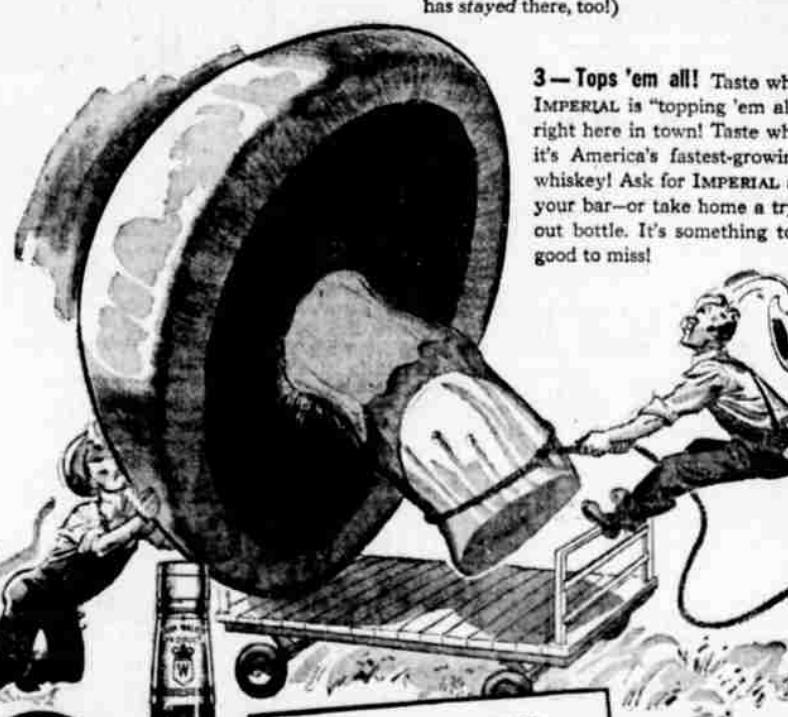
