

Dodgers and Yanks Both Capture Games With Ninth-Inning Bursts

WALK FORCES IN WINNING RUN AS BUMS BEAT PHILS

Keller Homers With Bases Bulging to Give Champs 8-4 Win Over Red Sox.

While it may never earn them a citation from the Office of Defense Transportation, the New York Yankees and Brooklyn Dodgers appear determined to save themselves and the baseball fans a lot of travel by keeping the 1942 World Series within range of a five-cent subway ride.

Yesterday at Ebbets field, the Dodgers went to bat in the ninth inning of a scoreless pitching duel between their ace, Lefty Larry French, and Rube Melton of the Philadelphia Phils. They loaded the bases on two singles and a walk and sent dangerous Dolph Camilli to the plate.

Camilli, however, didn't lay a bat on the ball. He merely waited out a walk which forced the winning run across, giving the Dodgers the verdict, 1-0.

Meanwhile, over in the Bronx, the Yankees went to bat against the Boston Red Sox with the score tied in the last half of the ninth. They also loaded the bases with one away and brought up Charlie (King Kong) Keller.

Keller picked out a pitch he liked, slammed it 420 feet into the right-center field bleachers for his 18th homer of the year and presented the Yankees with an 8-4 triumph.

Cards Win Two
The Cards downed the Chicago Cubs, 9-4 and 8-3. John Beazley registered his 13th pitching victory in the opener, although he yielded 10 of the 11 hits and failed to finish.

"Double No-Hit" Johnny Van Der Meer tossed a three-hitter at the Pittsburgh Pirates in a night contest which the Cincinnati Reds won, 3-0.

Earlier in the day, the Braves knocked the New York Giants loose from their hold on third place by sweeping a doubleheader, 1-0 and 8-2.

Murray Franklin's two-run single led the Detroit Tigers to a 4-2 triumph in the first game with Cleveland and Hal Newhouser blanking the Tribe, 2-0, on five hits in the second.

Elden Auker pitched the St. Louis Browns to a 6-3 decision over the Chicago White Sox.
A scheduled game between Washington and Philadelphia was postponed.

DICK BARRETT IS LOOP WORKHORSE

Los Angeles, Aug. 13.—(P)—They toast Dick Barrett in suds up Seattle way, and with reason. The star of the Pacific Coast league champion Rainiers may not be the loop's leading pitcher, but he's definitely the league's leading workhorse.

So far he's pitched 31 games, completing 26 of them, for 21 victories, 10 defeats, a .677 average and 147 strikeouts. Topping him slightly in the win and lost column are four members of the league-leading Los Angeles Angels, Ray Davis, Paul Gehrman, Jess Flores, and Hal Prim, as well as teammate Ray Turpin of the Rainiers, Blix Donnelly of Sacramento and Bob Joyce of San Francisco.

PROVOST UPHOLDS DORRIS PROTEST; REPLAY ORDERED

The protest of the Klamath Falls-Dorris game of July 25, filed by Allen (Red) Talbot, manager and owner of the Dorris (Cal.) Lumberjacks, has been upheld by Don Provost of Ashland, president of the Oregon-California Baseball league, and a replay of the disputed contest has been ordered.

Provost, announcing his decision yesterday after making a complete investigation of the facts leading to the protest, said he was notifying managers of both clubs immediately. Date of the game, he said, would be left in the hands of the teams involved.

The league president explained that it had been proved beyond a reasonable doubt that a ball hit by Paul Crapo, Klamath outfielder, with two men on base in the first inning of the game, had bounced over the fence.

The hit, Provost explained, as set forth in Talbot's protest, was allowed to go for a home run instead of a two-base hit contrary to rule 41, section 3 of the official baseball rules, which provides that "A fair hit ball that strikes the ground and bounces into a stand or over a fence shall be a two-base hit."

The loop proxy stated he had received a written statement from Pete Lesmeister, president of the Klamath Falls club, admitting that the ball bounced over the fence. Lesmeister, however, claimed that the decision had no bearing on the outcome of the game, while Talbot, in his protest, claimed it did, Provost said.

Klamath Falls won the game, 14 to 8, making 12 of their runs in the first three innings. Clyde Carlstrom was pitching for Dorris when Crapo hit his point-of-issue drive.

Grid Interest to Increase After War, Staggs Believes

Stockton, Calif., Aug. 13.—(P)—Hale and hearty as his 80th birthday approaches, Veteran Football Coach Amos Alonzo Staggs believes the war will have but little effect on the game, and when it's over there will be an expansion in gridiron interest.

"I don't think the war will affect the quality of the teams very much, especially at the large universities," said the white-haired College of Pacific mentor who coached University of Chicago teams through the Spanish-American and World wars.

"The big schools have so much material in normal times that they never utilize all of it. There is still plenty of it available for good football teams."

And after the war, Staggs said in an interview, interest in football should pick up because so many service men will have played the game, perhaps for the first time.

"There will always be a strong inclination for outdoor life and sports, and I have an idea that if the war lasts a long time, sports admission prices will go down, which will not be a bad thing."

Staggs' 53rd football campaign this year will be tougher than usual, for he will train his Pacific squad without the help of an assistant. Ralph Francis, the second in command last year, is now a lieutenant in the army.

Pacific, always a tough little team with a reputation for knocking over the big fellows, faces a schedule including University of Washington and the star-studded Navy Pre-Flight school at Moraga.

Beavers Split Twin Bill With Angels; Liska Loses Opener

The last-place Portland Beavers are not playing the way their Pacific Coast league baseball record indicates they should and the result is embarrassing the top Los Angeles club.

Last night the Beavers just missed sweeping a doubleheader from the Angels, who won the seven-inning opener, 5-4, in the final inning, but dropped a free-hitting second game 6-4.

In the nightcap Portland amassed 14 safeties to 11 hits collected by the Angels.

Ad Liska duelled Ken Raffensberger and Roy Davis, Angel hurlers, in the first game, as the Beavers played one of their rare error-less games. The Angels collected nine hits and the Beavers seven. Portland won on the previous night.

Sacramento, the second-place club, climbed to within two and one-half games of the Angels by thumping Oakland for the second consecutive night, 8-3.

The third-place Seattle Rainiers dropped a 10-inning first game of a doubleheader to San Francisco, 6-4, but Carl Fischer hurled the Rainiers to a 1-0 win with his two-hit performance in the seven-inning after piece.

At Hollywood, Bill Thomas yielded 10 hits but defeated his former employers, the San Diego Padres, 4-3.

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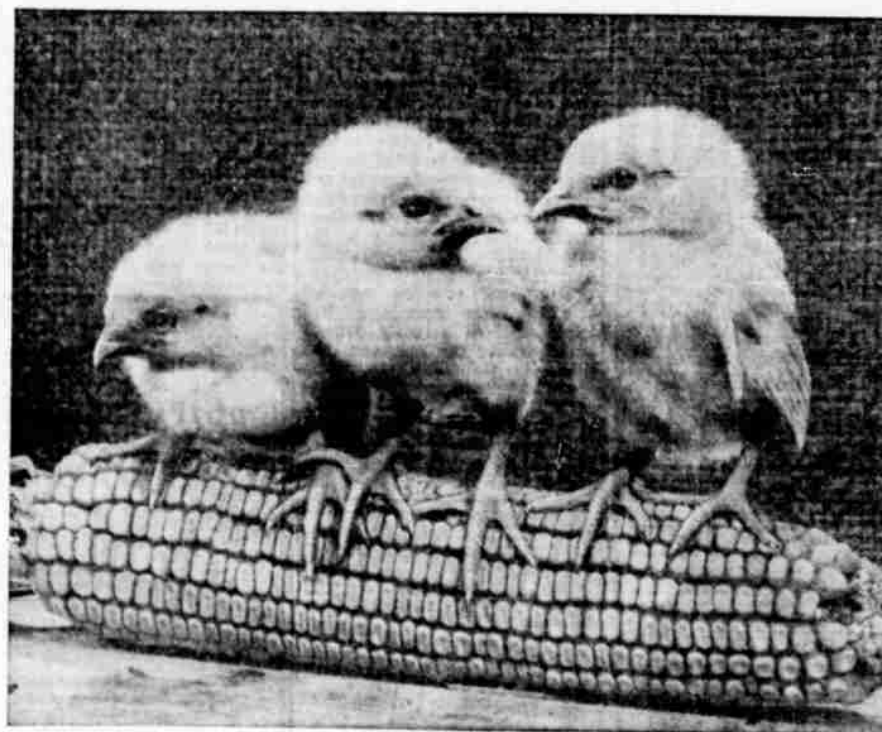
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
