Washington, Aug. 13—(P)—Katherine F. Lenroot, chief of the children's bureau, department of labor, announced today she had amended child labor regulations under the wage hour act to permit the employment, under carefully safeguarded conditions, of children 14 and 15 years of age in the cutting of pears, peaches and apricots in fruit dry yards during the school vacation. The general minimum age for employment of children in dry yards is 16.
