MRS. VOORHIES TO BE SPECIAL GUEST OF 91ST DIVISION

Widow of Former World War I Officer Will Attend Saturday Activation Rites.

Mrs. Gordon Voorhies of Eden Valley orchards, widow of Lieutenant Colonel Gordon Voorhies, will be a special guest of the 91st Infantry Division at its activation ceremonies at Camp White Saturday morning. It was announced today. Lieutenant Colonel Voorhies, who passed away in Medford, Sept. 13, 1940, was among the ranking officers of the old Pine Tree division when it was mustered out of service.

Activation ceremonies for the new 91st will find only four or five veterans of the old 91st signing the visitors' register from the immediate Medford vicinity, according to available information. Two activation ceremony rehearsals have been held, and officers in charge state that everything is in readiness for the program, which starts at 10 a. m.

Long Army Career

Lieutenant Colonel Voorhies was graduated from West Point in 1891, served in the Spanish-American war, was honorably discharged on March 31, 1899, and came to Medford to make his home in 1920. With the advent of World War I, he was eager to reenter the army, and, being unwilling to await arrival of a commission, entered the second officers' training camp at the Presidio, San Francisco, August 25, 1917.

Receiving appointment as major in the field artillery in September 1917, he was assigned to duty as adjutant in the 182nd infantry brigade and was promoted to lieutenant colonel on November 6, 1918 and assigned to the 364th infantry, serving until mustered out after the armistice.

His honors included the Belgian Croix de Guerre with palms.

Minimum Gas Stocks Edict For Stations

Washington, Aug. 14.—(P)—Petroleum Coordinator Ickes ordered service stations in Oregon and Washington today to maintain minimum reserve

stocks of either 500 gallons or one-fourth of the station's total gasoline storage capacity, whichever ever is the lesser quantity.

Ickes said the action was necessary to increase reserve stocks of gasoline in the two states in view of transportation uncertainties.

RUBBER SITUATION GROWING WORSE IS OPA AIDE'S WORD

Carl B. Cadwell, chief tire rationing officer of the rationing division of OPA for Oregon from Portland, said today that Americans must realize the seriousness of the tire rationing program and cooperate wholeheartedly in an effort to conserve rubber. He spent the day with the war price and rationing board in this city.

He stated that the rubber situation is becoming more acute each day due to the demand of the army and industry and the dwindling stock of tires. Cadwell said that no tires have been manufactured for civilian use since last year and the country must depend for the next few years on the stock of tires now in the hands of the manufacturing warehouses and branches, dealers and mail order houses.

He urged conservation by pooling the use of tires in city and rural districts, use of public transportation facilities, holding of speed to a maximum of 40 miles per hour, urged motor trucks to adhere to maximum load capacities, and careful servicing of tires for maximum wear.

Cadwell said the public should appreciate the great service that the war price and rationing board is carrying and should help and support the board to the best of its ability. He specifically stressed cooperative movements to reduce the use and wear on tires in order that the existing tire quota may be placed in the hands of those citizens deemed most needful of the rubber.

Wind Up Hearings On New Tax Legislation

Washington, Aug. 14.—(P)—The senate finance committee wound up public hearings on the new revenue bill today and prepared to take a 10-day respite before beginning work behind closed doors on extensive revisions to the house-approved measure.
