

Dover, Member of Old 91st To Give New Division First Weapon Taken from German

The first weapon captured by the 91st Division in World War I will be presented Saturday to the new 91st Infantry Division by the man who captured it—F. K. Dover, Grants Pass veteran of the historic Wild West fighting unit.

The gun, a German service rifle corresponding to the U. S. army's 30-caliber rifle, is said to have killed the first 91st division soldier to fall on the field of battle. Victim of the German sniper was Pvt. Lee Gautsche, a runner dispatched by Dover, then first sergeant of company I, 362 infantry. The gun was captured by Dover, who stormed the sniper's point of vantage and killed him a few minutes after Gautsche had fallen.

Carved on the stock of the gun are seven notches, apparently representing the number of men who had fallen before the German sniper's fire, but the German never lived to add Pvt. Gautsche to the record. Sergeant Dover was wounded in his charge against the sniper's position, but succeeded in killing the gunman who was delaying the progress of company I in its assault against German machine gun nests.

Dover, a leader in Oregon war veterans activities, was awarded two Silver Stars and the Croix de Guerre for valor and intrepidity beyond the call of duty during his service with the 91st in France and Belgium. He is the possessor of a Military Order of the Purple Heart medal, conferred upon American soldiers who received wounds in battle.

In announcing that the German weapon would be presented to the new "Powder River" division to be activated Saturday, ex-Sergeant Dover expressed the hope that many of his "buddies" would attend Activation day ceremonies which will effect a reunion of veterans of the AEF 91st.

PROBE DEATH OF AUTO KING'S SON

Detroit, Aug. 14.—(AP)—John Duval Dodge 43-year-old son of the late multi-millionaire automobile maker John F. Dodge, suffered a fracture at some time prior to his death in a hospital here last night, Wayne County Coroner Edmund J. Knobloch said today.

Dr. Knobloch emerged from an autopsy to make the bare announcement, then returned to the post mortem room.

Police Inspector John O. Whitman ordered the autopsy to aid in his investigation as to whether the injuries that caused Dodge's death were received during a domestic quarrel or in a scuffle at a precinct police station after he had been arrested Wednesday morning.

at Christmas time to resume advanced planning, and late in January, with America fully in the war, construction of the camp was authorized in Washington.

Five Take Contract
Construction was actually begun late in February, with the prime contract awarded to a syndicate of five companies, namely, Ford J. Twiss company of Los Angeles, Morrison-Knudsen company of Boise, Idaho, Peter Kiewit and Sons of Omaha, Nebraska, The Sound Construction company of Seattle and The Griffith company of Los Angeles.

First concrete was poured March 11 of this year and since then the job has stayed ahead of schedule throughout its construction. At the peak of construction early in July, many thousand workmen were employed. It is understood that construction is now substantially complete, except for a few minor phases.

Major Bean had words of praise for all members of the area engineer's office, including Captain Byron E. Doll, executive and engineering officer; First Lieutenant William A. Jones, property officer and Captain Lin Shields, who was in the engineer's office during a great deal of the construction period and who since has been appointed post engineer at Camp White, his function being to maintain and operate the utilities of the camp.

"All these men had a great deal to do with the successful construction of the camp," Major Bean said, as did civilian personnel who were exceptionally loyal and industrious.

In recognition of the excellent job done by the successful construction of the camp, Major General Charles H. Gerhardt, commander of the 91st division, has recommended that he be promoted to the rank of lieutenant colonel.

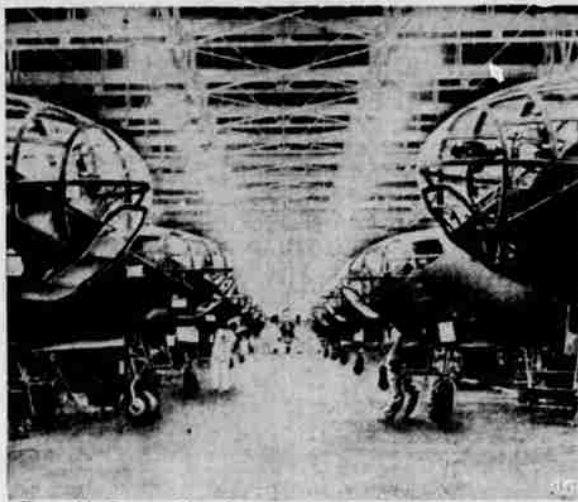

Salem, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Contract for grading and oiling 5.99 miles of the Seven Devils chrome mine access road west of Coquille was awarded today by the State Highway commission to the Tru-Mix Concrete Co., Medford, on a low bid of \$34,034.

SAM BROWN DIES AFTER LONG ILL

Portland, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Death took Sam Brown, the Gervais farmer who became one of Oregon's most colorful politicians, at a hospital late yesterday.

Virtually unknown by his full name, Samuel Henry Brown, he died after an extended illness at 68. He was a longtime member of the State Legislature, as representative in the 1915 and 1917 sessions and as senator from 1923 to 1933.

Twice, in 1934 and 1938, he sought the Republican nomination for governor, but it was his 1936 campaign against Charles L. McNary for the GOP senatorial nomination that perhaps attracted the most attention.

He stumped the state with "40 and a Ford" and when his tour was threatened by depleted funds he said, "I'll walk if I must." Many voters came to his aid with contributions of gasoline.

FLAMES DESTROY SILVERTON PLANT

Silverton, Ore., Aug. 14.—(AP)—More than \$10,000 damage was caused last night when fire destroyed the city-owned brick building housing the Victor Elmstrom Flax Processing plant.

The flames threatened the city hall, civilian defense headquarters, homes and other nearby buildings, but the spread was prevented by the Silverton, 8th. Angel and Stayton fire departments.

Exact cause of the fire is unknown. Portland, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Donald McDonald, 73, well known a decade ago in Pacific Coast boxing and wrestling circles, died at his home yesterday.

REPUBLIC STEEL SIGNS CONTRACT WITH UNION

Cleveland, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Republic Steel Corp. announced today it has signed a contract with the CIO United Steel

Workers of America, incorporating 44-cent daily pay raises recently ordered by the War Labor board.

The agreement came more than five years after the "little steel" strike for recognition—a

strike which kept almost a million workers in seven states idle for six weeks, resulted in the loss of 16 lives and then collapsed.
