

AMERICA TO LEAD IN NEXT CENTURY SAYS C-C LEADER

Control of Air Will Give Control of World is Belief—
Wealth, Production Ours.

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 14—(P)—"The next century is America's age," Eric A. Johnston, Spokane businessman and president of the United States Chamber of Commerce, predicted in an interview today.

"It will be America's age because this country will control the air, and thus will control the world," he explained. "We will have more airplane production and more trained air personnel than any other country."

ica's because we will control the air. The seas no longer are of first importance.

"Secondly, it will be America's age because we will be the

predominating country financially, with the wealth of much of the rest of the world destroyed.

Greatest Production
"Third, we will have the greatest general production of any country—and we are beginning to learn that the real source of all power is production. Gold itself is unimportant. You can't make a plane or a tank or a gun out of it."

"After the war we will have, through control of the air, supplemented by control of the seas, the means of distributing the fruits of our production over the world and bringing back the production of other countries."

"We will be leaders also because we will have here more of the world's leaders—men and women—in the fields of culture and science than any other country."

"The last century—England's—was imperialistic. The next century—America's—will be one of leadership."
