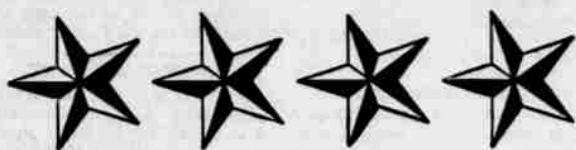

WILL REFOREST TILLAMOOK BURN

Portland, Ore., Aug. 14—(P)—A reforestation program that will, within a few years, form a green corridor along the Wolf Creek highway from Portland to the sea through the Tillamook Burn area, was announced today.

The anniversary of the start of the fire that swept over 300,000 acres from August 14 to 25, 1933, was chosen for announcement of the program by Orville Miller, Portland lumberman and spokesman for members of the industry planning it.

The reforestation will be on state-owned land but will be financed by lumber operators. Miller said, in an effort to increase public consciousness of the need for forest fire prevention as well as to provide a natural re-seeding area for adjacent privately owned land in the Burn.
