CRATERS GUN FOR FLAG IN 2-GAME SET AT KLAMATH

Locals Need Only One Win to Clinch Title—To Play Saturday and Sunday.

Needing only one victory to clinch the Oregon-California league pennant, Medford's Craters move to Klamath Falls this weekend for a two-game series that marks completion of the loop's 24-game schedule. Tills will be played Saturday twilight and Sunday afternoon.

The Craters, two full games in front of the second-place Pelicans, will send two southpaw pitchers against Manager Ernie Bishop's club; namely, Lieut. Norman Lewis and Jim Snyder. Manager Dutch Lieber was undecided today which of the left-handers would open the crucial set.

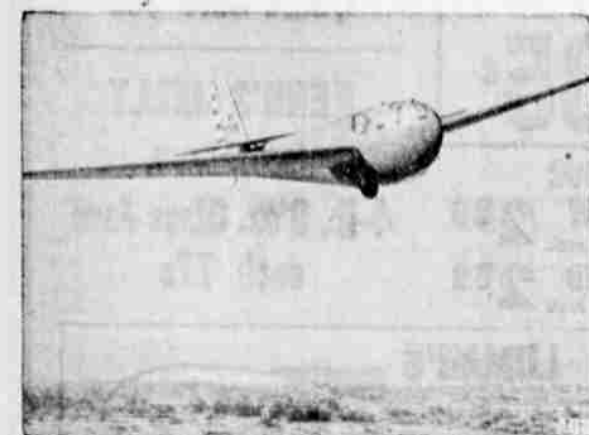
Klamath Falls will counter with Virgil Haynes and Kenny Benham, both of them right-handers, with Haynes probably getting the call for the Saturday twilight fracas. Klamath Falls must win both games to throw the pennant race into a tie and make a playoff necessary. One victory will give the Craters the championship. Regardless of how the pennant battle winds up, the Craters and Pelicans will engage in a three-game series for the President's cup, to be awarded the club taking two games by Don Provost of Ashland, league proxy.

In six games played between the two teams thus far, both have won three. Medford has beaten the Pelicans three out of four times in Medford, but lost both games to the Klamaths in their only trip to Klamath Falls. Manager C. F. Pruess of the Grants Pass Merchants announced yesterday that the Dorris, (Cal.) Lumberjacks, who were scheduled to play a doubleheader at Grants Pass Sunday, had forfeited the two games.

Oakland won the first of three games from Sacramento, 5-3. The Stars and the San Diego Padres collected eight hits, but the Padres bunched them effectively in the first and eighth innings to win out, 5-2.

BEAN BALL RULE FACES ACID TEST IN DOUBLEHEADER

The National league's new rule making managers subject to an automatic fine of \$200 for permitting their pitchers to blaze away at a rival's noggin is due for the acid test today when the Brooklyn Dodgers and the Boston Braves collide in a doubleheader which opens a five-game series.

Originally this was an open date for both teams, but the bargain bill at Ebbets field was made necessary when weather kept them apart last Sunday and again yesterday.

In the only one in the National league, the Chicago Cubs ended a four-game losing streak by walloping the St. Louis Cardinals, 13-5, and dropping the second-place Red Birds and a half game behind the Dodgers.

Claude Passeau notched his 16th pitching victory of the season against eight defeats, although he had to weather a ninth-inning Cardinal uprising

which produced four runs on as many hits.

In the American league, the Cleveland Indians came from behind in the ninth inning to edge out the Detroit Tigers, 3-2, for their first victory in their last eight starts, one of which ended in a tie.

The St. Louis Browns crushed the Chicago White Sox, 8-3,

largely through the efforts of Harland Clift who hit a home run, double and two singles and drove in four runs.

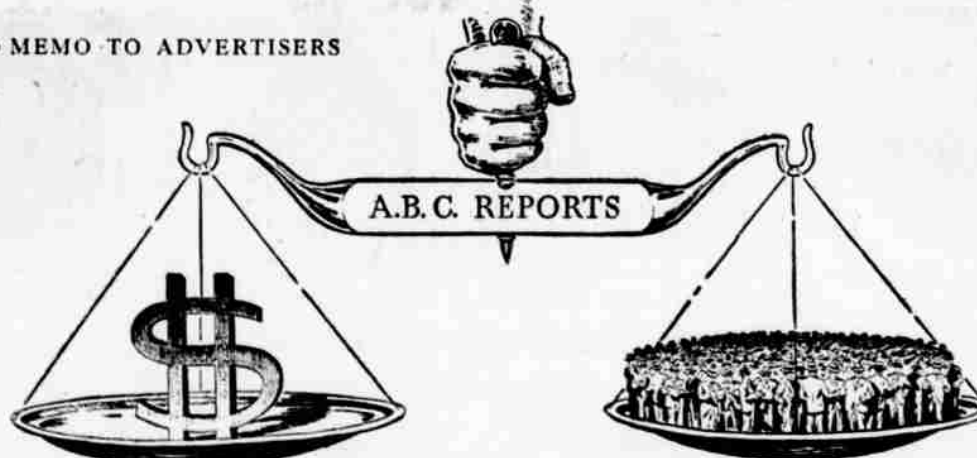
