

South Dakotan Appointed Black Tornado Coach for One Year

LORNE S. ARNOLD, YANKTON COLLEGE MENTOR SELECTED

Will Have Charge Three Major Sports—To Arrive About September 1.

Medford senior high school's new head football, basketball and track coach is 34-year-old Lorne S. Arnold, director of athletics and head mentor for the past two years at Yankton college, Yankton, South Dakota.

Arnold yesterday telephoned City School Superintendent E. H. Hedrick his acceptance of the salary terms offered for a one-year contract, and is expected to arrive in Medford, with his wife and one child, on or before September 1.

The South Dakotan will succeed J. Russell Acheson, who recently entered citizens' pilot training. Acheson, basketball coach for four years, was named football and track mentor when Lieutenant Bill Bowerman was called to active duty last winter, although his track team captured the state championship last spring he entered citizens' pilot training without ever having handled the Black Tornado football squad.

Arnold's appointment to guide the destinies of Tiger athletic teams for the ensuing school year climaxed a two weeks' period of negotiations between local school heads and coaches who might have been available for the local position. One of these was Orville (Red) Bailey, present Marshfield high mentor, but he was eliminated as a possibility when his school board refused to release him from his present contract. Hedrick pointed out that many boards were reluctant to release coaches at this time.

Record Strong

The new coach comes here with a brilliant record, not alone as a coach but as an athlete himself. His Yankton college basketball team last year captured the South Dakota college conference championship with 16 victories and three defeats; then entered the national intercollegiate tournament at Kansas City where it lost in the first round to High Point, N. C. college, 44 to 37 in an overtime contest. Arnold's 1942 track team also won the conference title, and his 1941 football eleven placed second.

During the 1940-41 season, under Arnold's mentoring, Yankton college's football and track teams capped the conference championships, and his cagers wound up in third place. Thus, in two years at Yankton, he turned out two track championships, one basketball and one football title team.

Prior to going to Yankton college Arnold coached basketball, football and track at Wessington Springs, (S. D.) high school from 1932 to 1937, his grid teams there enjoying a string of 23 games without defeat. From 1937 to 1940 he was director of physical education and football coach at Yankton high school, and in two of those three years his eleven won state championships.

Arnold is a 1927 graduate of Mitchell, (S. D.) high school, attended South Dakota State college for a year and a half and was graduated from Dakota Wesleyan university at Mitchell in 1932. He received his master's degree in physical education in 1939, from the University of Iowa.

While attending Dakota Wesleyan he was all-conference fullback, a member of the all-conference basketball team and high point man in the conference track meet his last two years, captaining the basketball and track teams his last year in school. In 1940 Arnold was president of the South Dakota Health and Physical Education association, and in 1941 was president of the Yankton Kiwanis club.

Both Hedrick and Leonard B. Mayfield, high school principal, expressed their deepest pleasure at being able to obtain a man so highly recommended as Arnold.

BOMBING OUTFIT PLANS FOOTBALL WARS THIS FALL

Fort George Wright, Wash., Aug. 15—(AP)—The second air force, strictly a bombing outfit, will do a bit of ground strafing on the side this fall against football teams from western colleges and other army units.

Headquarters announced today the second air force team—which has no nickname yet and is open for suggestions—would hit a circuit designed to give a large number of soldier airmen a look at a team clad in the second air force colors of blue, red and gold.

It added that a large number of well known grid stars would wear the unit's bright colors, but that the roster was not yet ready for release.

BEN HOGAN LEADS RICHMOND FIELD

Rochester, N. Y., Aug. 15—(AP)—Ben Hogan eased his blistering golfing pace today but even a third-round two-over par 72 failed to dislodge the slender Texan's five-stroke lead in the \$5,000 Times-Union open.

Hogan, who compiled a 64 and 68 in his first two rounds, hit the three-quarter mark in the tourney with a six-under par 204, five strokes better than the 209 of handsome Craig Wood, Mamaroneck, who shot a great 67 today, and Harold (Jug) McSpaden, Philadelphia, who turned in a 72.

Hogan, the game's leading money winner who seems almost certain to add the \$1,000 top prize to his earnings at the tourney's end tomorrow, toured the first nine today in regulation figures. Coming in, however, he bogied the 588-yard par 5 thirteenth and the 462-yard par 4 seventeenth.

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MILBURN, ACE OF POLO BACKS DIES OF HEART ATTACK

New York, Aug. 15—(AP)—Devereux Milburn, 61 generally regarded as the greatest back ever developed in polo, fell dead of a heart attack on the ninth tee at the Meadow Brook Golf club late today.

For the 21 years the handicap rankings made him the greatest player in the world, listing his handicap at nine goals from 1908 through 1917 and at 10, the sport's highest, for 12 years. He started in polo as a 17-year-old youth at Buffalo where his father permitted him to join the latter's club because it didn't have enough players for a scrimmage.

From then on he was an outstanding player, helping Henry Payne Whitney bring the famed Westchester cup to the United States from England for the first time in 1909.

Milburn was credited with revolutionizing the back's play by leaving the post, previously regarded as a purely defensive position and joining in the hard riding, another contribution of 1909 United States big four.

TUCSON WINS IN LEGION PLAY-OFF

Denver, Aug. 15—(AP)—Tucson, Ariz., put together three six-run innings for an 18 to 2 triumph over Bingham, Utah, in the regional American Legion junior baseball tournament today.

The teams are champions of their two states. Tucson will play Denver tomorrow, for the regional championship and the right to compete in the sectional tournament at Miles City, Mont., Thursday. Denver advanced safely by defeating Albuquerque, N. M., champion, 12 to 4 today.

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
