15 WELDERS FROM CLASSES HERE TO KAISER SHIPYARDS

Fifteen persons who have been attending the welding classes conducted at the high school are leaving at once for the Kaiser shipyards at Vancouver, Wash., their employment having been arranged by T. M. Murphy, a "talent scout" for the big yard who was here Saturday conferring with E. H. Hedrick, superintendent of Medford schools.

According to Mr. Murphy the shipyard needs a large number of welders, men and women, from 18 years up, and he stated that by entering the classes here it is possible to learn enough in a few weeks to qualify for a journeyman's pay. After arrival at the yard the student may continue training in the free classes maintained by the yard, enabling promotion and higher pay as proficiency is attained.

The shipyard maintains dormitories where workers may share a room at a cost of \$3.50 per week, or occupy a single room at \$5. Everything is furnished except tooth brushes, according to Mr. Murphy. Huge dining rooms are available to the worker, meal tickets costing \$10.15 for 21 meals.

Those going to the yard are asked not to bring their families at first. Housing is a problem in the Portland area and the Kaiser company is able only to house workers in dormitories at present. Later, however, 21,000 pre-fabricated houses will be available. There are special dormitories for women and a large number are actively employed at the huge yard.

Mr. Murphy said the company expects to have 60,000 on the payroll by February and he urged those not presently employed in war work to gain training in the high school classes so that they may help.

Bond sales are continuing a rapid pace it was reported today and money from the bond sales through Saturday will be designated for purchase of army equipment for Camp White soldiers.

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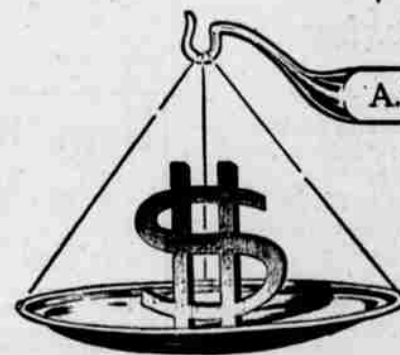
