

Lieut. Norm Lewis Hurls Craters To Oregon-California Loop Flag

KLAMATH BEATEN 3-1 AS SOLDIER YIELDS 3 BLOWS

Pelicans Win Sunday Game, 8-7—First Tilt Of Cup Series Here Wednesday.

Lieut. Norman Lewis of the 91st Infantry Division flung a beautiful three-hit masterpiece at Klamath Falls Saturday night to give the Medford Craters a 3 to 1 victory over the Pelicans and the 1942 Oregon-California league championship. Klamath came back Sunday to edge out the locals, 8 to 7, but the game was a mere formality, as that Saturday night victory irrevocably clinched the pennant for Dutch Lieber's hustling crew.

With the regular loop schedule completed, the Craters and Pelicans now face a three-game series for the President's cup, the first tilt to be played here Wednesday night at 9 o'clock. The second contest is slated for Klamath Falls next Saturday night, and if a third and deciding game is needed it will be staged in Medford Sunday, August 30.

Lieber Leaving
Manager Dutch Lieber will say farewell to Medford following Wednesday night's game. He is leaving Thursday morning to report to his draft board in Oakland, Calif., for induction into the army, and in recognition of his service here during the past two years the Medford Athletic Association has designated the Wednesday game as "Lieber Night." The year's largest crowd is expected to be on hand to send Big Dutch on his way into the service.

Lieut. Lewis, pitching the pennant-clincher Saturday night, fired that left-handed curve and fast ball past a dozen Pelicans for the third strike. Two of the three mealy blows he allowed were scratchers, and for seven innings the Klamaths were unable to reach home plate.

While the army southpaw was handcuffing the hard-hitting Pelicans, the Craters were collecting seven blows off Virgil Haynes, Klamath fireballer. The locals bunched Al Wray's double, Lieber's single and an error for a run in the first inning, picked up another in the fourth on walks to John Gitz and Lewis, and Norm Worthley's single, and completed their scoring in the ninth on Lewis' walk and Worthley's second single.

After being blanked for seven frames, the Pelicans finally broke through for their lone tally in the eighth on a walk and Hatfield's single.

Madden Hits
Haynes fanned six Craters and pitched a nice game, but his teammates couldn't cope with the Lewis benders.

Don Madden got three of Medford's six hits, Worthley got two and Lieber and Wray accounted for one apiece. Larsen collected two of Klamath's bingles and Hatfield the other.

Klamath snatched the Sunday game with a four-run burst in the eighth inning, after the Craters had led to that point. Jim Snyder, Crater southpaw, yielded 13 hits in going the route, while Kenny Benham, Pelican righthander, gave the Craters nine blows.

Lange and Snyder each hit twice for the locals, while Manager Ernie Bishop made three of Klamath's hits.

52 Colleges Quit Football Due To War, Survey Shows

New York, Aug. 17—(P)—Fifty-two colleges gave up football since last season, an Associated Press survey discloses, with Gonzaga of Spokane making the announcement with such finality that Head Coach Pully Hunton immediately announced his candidacy for sheriff.

But Coach Hunton wouldn't have needed to make the transition that obvious because the same survey revealed that at least 61 other colleges hired new gridiron professors during the year.

The war was the major factor in the changes and President G. S. Sanders of Southwestern, Okla., Tech, explained his school's dropping of the sport with:

"We can save \$5,000 and the war is more important. Our boys can chase the pigs, not the pig-skin and kick hell out of the Japs, not out of a football."

Almost all the coaching switches were instigated by the war except for such isolated cases of routine changes as Colorado State where Harry Hughes resigned after 31 years, the University of Washington where Jimmy Phelan's contract wasn't renewed, Stanford, Holy Cross and Illinois.

The navy drew heavily upon the football coaching fraternity for its physical toughening-up program with Bernie Bierman of Minnesota now heading the Iowa Seahawks, James Crowley of Fordham guiding the North Carolina candidates, Sam Barry of Southern California in charge at St. Mary's and Matty Bell of Southern Methodist at Georgia.

After what happened to their pitchers in last month's all-star game, the National league master minds should be giving themselves a good mental kicking every time they read Al Javery's name in a box score these days.

The Boston Braves' string bean currently is about the hottest pitcher in either league, fast living up to Manager Casey Stengel's solemn prediction of the spring that he would be recognized as one of the game's great hurlers before the season ended.

When he blanked the Dodgers 2 to 0 in seven innings yesterday, setting the league leaders down with a single hit, Javery completed his 19th consecutive inning without having allowed a run. In his last four games, in which he has defeated Brooklyn twice and Cincinnati and New York once each, the tall young man from Auburn, Mass., has given up exactly one run. Five of his 10 victories this year have been shutouts, which is tall pitching for a seventh place out-

Cubs Win Two
After defeating a double licker the previous day, the Chicago Cubs came back behind some tight pitching by Bill Lee and Les Fleming to hand Pittsburgh the same dose, 5-1 and 4-1.

Mel Ott's Giants tightened their hold on third place in the National by trimming the Phils 6-3 and sweeping the four-game series.

The Boston Red Sox took a firmer grip on second place in the American League as they swept their second doubleheader with Washington in as many days, 6-4 and 10-3.

Home runs by Joe Dimaggio and Joe Gordon, each with a mate on base, paced the Yankees to an 11-2 victory over the Athletics in a six-inning affair at Shibe Park.

Detroit came from behind twice to win two decisions over the Chicago White Sox, 3-2 and 7-3.

Cleveland and the St. Louis Browns battled all afternoon to a stand-off, the Indians winning the first game 3-2 in 11 innings and the scrapping Browns taking the second 6-1.

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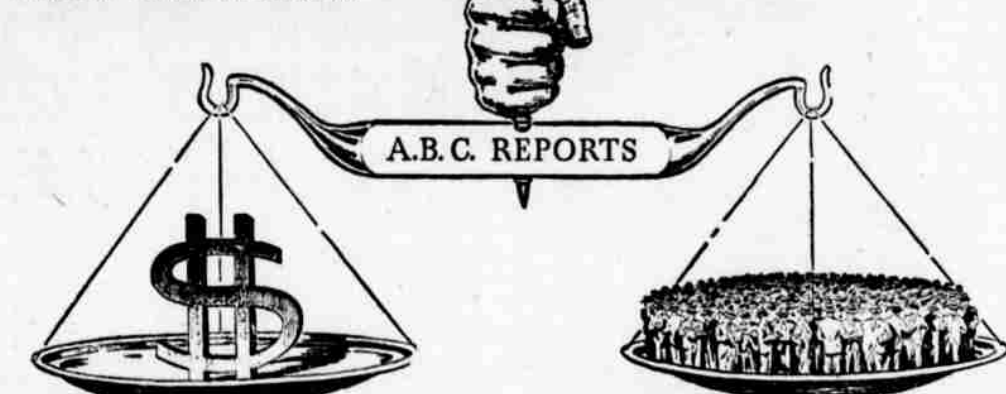
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
