CALL ALERT FOR DEFENSE TRUCKS SUNDAY MORNING

The transportation unit of the civilian defense committee (heavy division) called a practice alert at 3:45 a. m. Sunday.

Men were instructed to report to the committee's headquarters with trucks at Grants Pass, Medford or Ashland, depending upon the closest point. Within thirty minutes of the alert nine trucks had reported to the Grants Pass headquarters. Within one and one-half hours from the time of the alert, sixty-five units consisting of trucks and trailers, tractors and semi-trailers and solo trucks had reported to the combined headquarters in Grants Pass, Medford and Ashland. Twelve more units reported in addition to the transportation units reporting, fuel trucks, tow cars, tire supply cars, service cars with mechanics and vehicles for communications reported to headquarters.

Although equipment was needed for the transportation of only 187 tons of commodities and 50 men, this being the first practice alert held by the committee, all trucks possible to reach were called out. This procedure brought one hundred fifteen men on the job before 5:30 a. m. or within one and three quarters hours, and sufficient equipment to transport 243 tons of commodities.

Owners of equipment who have not registered their trucks for use during an emergency should do so at once at the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce.

CIVILIAN CARS AT CAMP TOTAL 2700

Headquarters of the 91st Infantry Division reported today that 45 minutes after completion of the activation ceremonies at Camp White Saturday, the entire 91st division area was cleared of civilian traffic.

It was also reported that 2,700 civilian cars were parked in the parking lots, that 4,000 civilians were taken to and from the camp in commercial buses, and that 900 civilians were transported in trucks provided by the army. An estimated 10,000 civilians witnessed the impressive activation ceremonies and demonstrations.

Two thousand civilians, it was reported, were conducted on tours through the camp from 8 to 10 a. m.

Utah Buys Buffaloes
Salt Lake City, Utah—(U.P.)—Utah now has a full-fledged herd of buffalo. It was purchased from Yellowstone National park and shipped here recently. The buffalo have been placed with remnants of a herd which was planted in Utah several years ago.
